

The greater Muskegon community is indeed fortunate to have a variety of organizations focused on making sure those of us with disabilities can have full and productive personal and professional lives.

This week's panel discussion, moderated by Rotary DEI Committee co-chair **Andy Buelow**, featured experts in the field to discuss their roles in working with those with disabilities.

Our panelists were:



Panelist Amy Cumings, job placement supervisor with Goodwill Industries of West Michigan

Amy Cumings is the job placement supervisor with Goodwill Industries of West Michigan, where she has worked since 2015. In her current role, Amy cultivates partnerships with local businesses committed to inclusive hiring, helping them unlock the full potential of their workforce. She is a colleague of Rotarian Jeanette Hoyer.



Panelist and Rotarian **Myra Dutton**, CEO of HGA Support Services.

Rotarian **Myra Dutton** is the CEO at HGA Support Services, a nonprofit providing residential and autism training support to persons in Newaygo, Muskegon, Oceana and Mason counties for the past 45 years.




Panelist and Rotarian **Brad Hastings**, Systems Advocacy Manager at Disability Network West Michigan

Rotarian **Brad Hastings** is the Systems Advocacy Manager at Disability Network West Michigan, where he leads efforts to remove barriers for people with disabilities through education, advocacy, collaboration and outreach.



Our panel to discuss disability service available in greater Muskegon.





Panelist and Rotarian Jill Bonthuis, CEO of Pioneer Resources.

Rotarian **Jill Bonthuis** is the CEO of Pioneer Resources, a nonprofit serving Muskegon and Ottawa counties to provide access to housing, training, recreation and transportation for seniors and individuals with disabilities.

Andy covered a variety of issues with our panel. On the topic of how can workplaces, schools, and communities improve representation and visibility of people with disabilities in leadership roles, Cumings suggested having employee mentorship programs would be helpful. Hastings said having not only your organization's employees but also board members include those with disabilities "can make your workplace more inclusive."

Bonthuis said looking at an organization's hiring procedures and making sure there are no barriers to being able to apply and understanding a workplace's employee assistance programs are important for potential employees.

Andy raised the issue of "Intersectionality" and how do factors such as race, gender, and socioeconomic status intersect with disability, and how can we ensure DEI efforts are inclusive of these intersections. Hastings said he often points out that "disability is the largest minority group you can join at any time" no matter your gender, race, socioeconomic status, etc. Cumings added that in her career, she's seen many instances that women and non-binary individuals with disabilities are often overlooked.

Several of the panelists reminded us that many disabilities can be invisible. Hastings said the Americans with Disabilities Act addresses any disability that "impacts a primary work function."

The group also discussed "equality vs equity." Bonthuis relayed a story of a worker who used a wheelchair and was thrilled with his job as well as his co-workers but mentioned he wished he could have a hot lunch while at work. When someone indicated there was a microwave in the break room, they soon realized it was at a level not reachable for the colleague in the wheelchair. "You need to always be looking at your workplace" Jill said.

The panel shared several personal stories they have related to family members with disabilities. Dutton, who is the parent and guardian of a daughter with multiple disabilities, said "When you are a parent you

want your child to do what everyone else wants to do." She recounted a story when she was throwing an 18th birthday party for her daughter, a student at Wesley School. Another parent called to thank her, and in tears, said her daughter had never been invited to a birthday party.

In a related matter, the panelists reminded us of the 6:30 p.m. April 15 free showing of Crip Camp. Information is above in the *RIM*.


