This Week's Program: Food Insecurity - Panel Discussion

Panelists: Rob Mathis (Citi Boi), Kaitlin Hermanson (McLaughlin Grows at Trinity Health), and Larry Williams (HW Farms)

Rob Mathis of City Boi, Kaitlin Hermanson of McLaughlin Grows Urban Farm, and Larry Williams of HW Farms discuss food insecurities in Muskegon and how they're helping!

Prompt 1: Please tell us a little about your organization and how you got started.

Citi Boi: Citiboi got started during the pandemic because people were losing their jobs and needed help. We started by providing lunches for the community.

McLaughlin Grows: We started the Urban Farm at Trinity Health in July of last year. We have a 36-week ag program with a Farm Share program. We provide education and provide produce to patients.

HW Farms: In May of 2023, we began as a community garden concept, but over time we changed to a teaching farm. We grow over 40 different crops. People come to learn about growing food and can leave with produce. We also provide food and cooking education. We are working to make sure we can use all our crops and don't have food waste.

(**Lisa Tyler** provided a side note about the article in the latest Rotary Magazine about food waste. *If you haven't read it, take the time to check it out.*)

Prompt 2: What challenges have you faced?

Citi Boi: We had challenges getting funding, getting our 501c3 status, getting information out into the community, and disbursement of food. We partnered with Feeding America West Michigan.

McLaughlin Grows: Our programs in Ann Arbor and Oakland had great models, but we had to adapt them to fit our community of Muskegon. We needed to integrate it into the community and make sure the community had a voice in the process. Our goal was 50 boxes per week out the door, those programs were much larger.

HW Farms: Our main challenges were what to do with excess produce and finding time to do it all.

Prompt 3: How are you engaging with the community and motivating people to get involved?

HW Farms: We are using social media to increase awareness and reach community influencers. To get volunteer engagement, we have a "donate (#) minutes and get (this much) produce" model. We are also getting the word out about our farm incubator program.

McLaughlin Grows: Volunteers are very important! We use United Way of the Lakeshore's volunteer portal. Volunteers can harvest, trellis tomatoes, cut bouquets for patients, etc. We hold free monthly education programs. When the gates are open and we are on site, people are welcome to stop in and tour the site.

Citi Boi: We use Facebook to communicate. We hold monthly mobile food pantries at Community United Methodist Church. We also have a clothing pantry and provide household items and furniture to those who need it, so we accept donations of items.

Prompt 4: Tell us about your partnerships with other entities.

Citi Boi: Feeding America is an essential partnership to help us get low-cost food for distribution. We also partner with the Hope Project, Every Woman's Place, and other organizations.

McLaughlin Grows: We partner with Agewell and MDHHS. We also partner with MAISD to make sure that our garden education programs are complementary to and not duplicative of theirs.

HW Farms: Lakeshore Flavor helped us with grant funding. We also partner with Access Health and Kids Food Basket. We work with McLaughlin Grows on a CSA food share. I have about 8 meetings a week with area partners.

Prompt 5: How do you measure impact?

McLaughlin Grows: The hospital completes a Community Health Needs survey. We also have gotten reporting and data collection and analysis ideas from our other sites. We look at how well we are focusing on our priority populations, the number of hours we have volunteers, the number of families we are serving, etc. Right now we are working on our annual report.

HW Farms: It's difficult since we are just starting out. We measure what we grow, versus compost and the number of families served.

Citi Boi: Google reviews!

Prompt 6: Share a success story.

HW Farms: We purchased blighted property in Muskegon Heights (2639 Sixth Street). It took us a year to clean it up. Images on Google Earth show our progress.

McLaughlin Grows: Having our first orientation group for our Food Share program and getting to hear their stories. Getting to know them and sending them home with a plant that they can grow food with.

Citi Boi: While out picking up donations, I got a call that there were clients at the office. A woman and her four daughters had just relocated to the area with Every Woman's Place's assistance. We got her set up with everything she needed so she could concentrate on helping her family adjust. They are in a house and flourishing!

Audience Question 1: With the cuts to the USDA and Feeding America, how will that affect you?

Citi Boi: We don't know what is going to happen. We are concentrating on other options.

HW Farms: We haven't seen any effects so far. Our grant is through the Health Project.

Audience Question 2: What do you know about the new efforts related to the Muskegon County Food Club?

It is in development still. The plan is for a food pantry model where patrons would pay a membership fee that is based on income and family size and provides "purchase points" to use at the pantry. It will be a dignity and choice based model. It will be a few years still before it is off the ground.

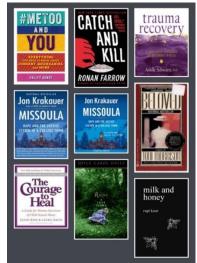

Muskegon Rising Podcast S2E13: Bill O'Brien – Mona Shores Public Schools



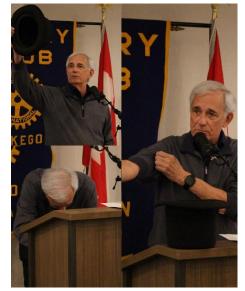

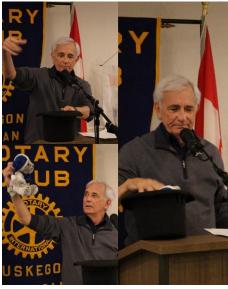

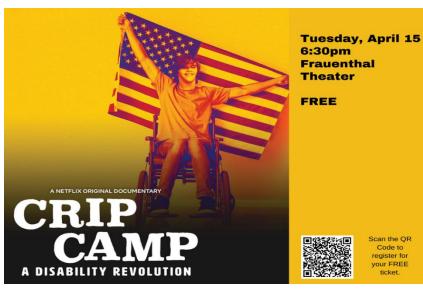

El Salvador Trip is off to a Great Start







Esther Ricco reports that all is going very well with the six houses nearing completion in Talnique, El Salvador. It is hot and humid in the 90's, but spirits are high and steady progress is being made each day in this mountain village. Families who will own the homes are working alongside our Interact and Rotary volunteers. Clothing, shoes, and book donations will be distributed this Sunday.

Our Muskegon Rotary Club raised \$4,000 for materials for one complete home and also raised over \$2000 (besides a lot of pop cans!) to help defray student travel costs. In total, District 6290 Interact and Rotary clubs raised approximately

\$24,000 to build six new homes in Talnique. We are also assisted by the Noroeste Rotary Club of San Salvador to financially and logistically bring the project to fruition each year.

Please note the Day 3 report below from **Jamina Chervenak** from the Muskegon High School Interact Club for the impact it is making on her:
