
This Week's Program: **Panel Presentation on Community Pride**, **Connection & Belonging**

Introductions and a little about the panelists:

Addie Witmer: She/They. A Muskegon High School graduate headed to George Washington University in DC. Was involved in Interact. Representing West Shore Gender Sexuality Alliance (GSA)

Ken McCallum: He/Him. Representing QPro+, a business networking group for the LGBTQ community. Went to college in Grand Rapids. He and his partner have been together 25 years.

Ellie Daniels: 1980 Muskegon High School graduate. Lived in the Southeast US most of her adult life, primarily South Carolina. Recently moved back to Muskegon. Breast cancer survivor. Representing Golden Years Lunch Group and Muskegon Pride.

Tell us something interesting about yourself.

Addie: You may have seen me as Christopher in the Curious Incident of the Dog in Nighttime.

Ken: I worked at McDonalds for 28 years and can sing the Big Mac song backwards (and he proved it!)

Ellie: We are all just humans. My favorite ice cream is Moosetracks.

Please tell us a little about your organization.

Addie: West Shore GSA is a social group for LGBTQ teens. Even though it meets at the St. John's Episcopal Church, it is not religious in nature. The group is for 13–18-year-olds. They do a LOT of snacking, crafts,

movies, karaoke, and recently had a booth at Muskegon Pride and participated in the Hands Off Protest. Check out their Facebook

Ken: QPro+ was inspired by the Grand Rapids Chamber's OutPro program. He brought it to Muskegon in October 2023. We are professionals who provide referrals to each other. We want to make it easier for people to find businesses where they can feel safe and comfortable. The group also took over the sticker project and provides DEI training. Ellie: I was worried when my partner and I moved to a relatively small town after living in Ashville, SC, which had a thriving LGBTQ community. We went to Muskegon Pride's Coffee with Friends, held every Saturday from 10 to noon at The Coffee Factory. We found that there was a thriving community here and that Muskegon Pride is responsible for that. Golden Years was started by Dennis Halsey. It's Lunch for Seniors program is an opportunity for those over 55 years old to network. It can be hard to make connections later in life. This provides that opportunity. What is your why?

Addie: It's fun! We started by helping the church with its open and affirming covenant. When it was chartered, we wanted to show that with a community group for LGBTQ teens. It can be hard to know the members of your community. Safely meeting others in the "open" can be difficult. This is a way to find real life friends who care. It normalizes relationships. My belief is that God hates no one.

Ken: We started due to the same types of fears. In the restaurant industry, there is a high LGBTQ population. As an Aflac insurance agent, it's not the same. When I say, "Allen and I" when talking about my life, some people ask who Allen is. Some don't want to do business with me when they find out. This group provides a safe place to talk business and to find businesses that you can feel confident doing business with.

Ellie: There were over 11,000 people at Muskegon Pride last week. The numbers were amazing. (Hackley Park with be the venue going forward!) Activism calls me. This is my hometown. I was a closeted lesbian in high school. On senior skip day, some boys beat up a gay classmate. That terrified me! Lots of things like this have happened. It is important to me to support these organizations and the LGBTQ community – to empower

me and for me to help empower others.

Audience question to Addie:

How are you reaching out to teens in the entire community?

We reach out to all the local schools' GSA groups and they can recommend us to their students. A lot of it is word of mouth.



tools and receive expert guidance to bring their ideas to life. It's open to students, entrepreneurs, small businesses, museums, clubs, and anyone with a creative spark.


The Fab Lab is equipped with a wide array of tools, including 3D

printers, laser cutters, CNC routers, plasma and water jet cutters, metal milling tools, vinyl printers, digital scanners, and t-shirt heat presses. These powerful resources enable users to explore product design, prototyping, and small-scale

manufacturing.

During our visit, we viewed a variety of finished projects on display, showcasing the lab's creative potential. A highlight of the evening was watching Carim design and print custom stickers for each visitor to take homean exciting hands-on demonstration of the equipment in action

Memberships to the Fab Lab are available for individuals, families, and organizations. These memberships support. The lab also offers educational programs such as focused on promoting STEM (Science, Technology, Engineering, and Mathematics) learning for K-12 students.
