Missy Horton opened her introductory remarks by asking her fellow Muskegon Rotarians if we are aware that there are forty-seven festivals planned for summer 2025, and followed with another question, "Why do we enjoy our summer festivals so much?" She responded with a succinct two-word answer, "Food and beer." Our three presenters followed with details about the festivals each represents and ways to enjoy summer fun along the lakeshore.

Our first presenter, Chase Klairter, works for the City of Norton Shores Parks and Recreation Department, who put on the Arts and Drafts Festival. While Norton Shores lacks a dedicated downtown, the city uses the community gathering at the 12th Annual Arts and Drafts Festival to celebrate the city of Norton Shores. This year's festival is set for Saturday, August 16 at Ross Park.

The day's activities begin at 8:00 a.m. with the Arts and Dash, a 5K race organized by City Commissioner and Muskegon Rotarian, Jamie Sowa. The craft show, celebrating its 48th year, follows at 10:00 a.m. and runs until 5:00 p.m. The show has grown from seventy-five vendors to 125 and counting for 2025. The Arts and Wheels car show begins at 11:00 a.m. and runs until 3:00 p.m. when fellow Muskegon Rotarian, Mayor Gary Nelund will present a trophy to the car show winner.

As noted by Missy, the festival includes a Beer Tent featuring live music from 11:00 a.m. to 10:00 p.m. The bands are 10 Years Late, West Side Soul Surfers, and Yard Sale Underwear. In addition, there is a kids activity area including a bounce house, and a water-skiing show presented by Grand City Show Skiers on Mona Lake. Alicia Kantola, our second speaker, is the President of the Muskegon County Fair Board, the volunteer organization that owns and presents the Muskegon County Fair. The Muskegon County Fair boasts a 97-year history of showcasing agriculture in Muskegon County. The 2025 fair will run from Saturday, July 19 through Saturday, July 26, at the Muskegon County Fairgrounds on

6621 Heights Ravenna Road, Fruitport. This large venue hosts 160 campsites ranging from primitive to full amenities. The Fair includes a plethora of events, competitions, livestock shows, a horse show, and more contests than you can imagine. Some highlighted events include a large Craft Fair to kick off the Fair on Saturday, July 19, a Livestock Auction on July 24, and a Pancake Breakfast on July 26. Ms. Kantola noted that Sportsmen for Youth and the Boy Scouts help with many of the Fair Board's events and at fairgrounds events, too. She closed her remarks by encouraging Muskegon Rotarians to visit the Muskegon County Fairgrounds website to learn about other events happening during the summer and fall.

Batting third, Jason Piasecki began by polling our Club members to learn how many members are of Polish heritage. like Polish food, Polish beer, and would like to be a sponsor for a fun-filled community event. The newest festival, Polish Fest is celebrating its 10th anniversary on Labor Day Weekend, August 29-30, from 11:30 a.m. to 10:00 p.m. at Hackley Park. While Len Piasecki and Tom Sanocki founded the festival, Jason acknowledged a Muskegon Rotary connection through Tim Lipan, who shared his event planning expertise with Jason and his dad. Jason's mom, Donna, who is the current President of the organization,

shares the family enthusiasm for this community event.

While ten percent of the Muskegon County population has Polish roots, everyone is welcome to enjoy this community event celebrating Polish heritage. There will be live music including a Polka band and dance floor. Wonderland Distilling will be serving Bloody Mary's to kick off the festivities along with both Polish and American food and beverages; Hamburger Mikey will even be offering a Polish hamburger. There will be a tent for the military along with a Polish Heritage tent presented in collaboration with the University of Michigan. To honor our military and first responders, these two groups will have free admission on Friday, August 29. Morning crew usually meets at/behind Frontier Mart at the corner of Seaway and Southern at 7am and put roughly 35 large flags in marked receivers in the center of the Seaway median from Southern to Hackley.

The evening crew is at 6pm, and depending on who volunteers, they either pick up volunteers at Frontier Mart and then start picking up flags in reverse order from the morning crew - drive to Hackley Rd and work their way back to Frontier Mart, or they just head to Hackley Rd at 6pm and get started.

It helps to have an SUV or pickup truck for one of the drivers, so that we have a place to store the flags as we move along Seaway.

New Dues Structure for the New Rotary Year

On behalf of the Muskegon Rotary Board of Directors, President Tim and President Elect Dave are sharing the following information on member dues:

- * The 2025-26 Muskegon Rotary Club budget has an approximately 2 percent increase in quarterly membership dues.
- * Starting July 1, 2025, the quarterly dues for regular members will be \$187 (\$184 dues and \$3 Paul Harris contribution).
- * For ReWine Satellite Club members the quarterly dues will be \$101 (\$98 dues and \$3 Paul Harris contribution).
- * At this time, the method of dues payments will remain the same. The modest dues increase reflects the reality of inflation while trying to keep club membership as affordable as possible.
- * Members who elected to pay dues by ACH debit to their bank account this past year will continue to have their dues debited to their bank account quarterly.
- * For any members who pay by credit card and want to avoid credit card processing fees, you can sign up for ACH payments by contacting Treasurer Kristi Nagengast (kristikkn@gmail.com).




At the conference, I learned about the power of paradigm shifts and the importance of choosing a positive attitude.
