#### West Michigan Shoreline Regional Development Commission Marks 55 yrs

Our own **Erin Kuhn** shared with the Club all about her day job leading a 55-year-old organization that does many things behind the scenes to enhance a five-county West Michigan region.



Since 2014, Erin has served as executive director of the West Michigan Shoreline Regional Development Commission, or WMSRDC for short. "It's a mouthful and it's not a bad word, I promise," Erin joked about the organization's interesting sounding acronym. A West Michigan native, Kuhn has worked for the organization for more than 25 years.

"We are a local, state and federally designated regional planning agency," Kuhn said, for five counties:
Muskegon, Oceana, Newaygo, Lake and Mason counties. There are slightly different boundaries for transportation planning, with that adding northwest Ottawa County. First chartered in 1970, WMSRDC is an important cog in the regulatory engine to draw down state and federal funding in several key areas:

- Transportation: Metro areas, regional and rural
- Economic Development
- Environmental
- Local Government Services
- Geographic Information Systems
- Information & Communications

"We help do the administrative work to unlock those dollars here in West Michigan," Kuhn said of her small but mighty staff of nine "who are experts in their areas. If we don't know the answer, we know where to find the answer."

The planning area boundaries are reviewed each decade through the U.S. Census. Dues from local governmental units help fund the organization. WMSDRC also receives funding to carry out the administrative tasks of applying for and implementing grants. The organization is governed by a 21member board which includes representatives from all five counties and from some of the 120 municipalities within WMSRDC's boundaries. Rotarians Rachel Gorman, a Muskegon City Commissioner, Roger Morgenstern, a Norton Shores City Council Member, and Chris McGuigan, a Muskegon County Commissioner, Represent their communities on the WMSRDC

board. Kuhn also recognized several other Rotarians who are past board members.

For example, in transportation alone, WMSRDC is involved in more than \$30 million road construction projects annually, from highway interstates to local and county road improvements, Kuhn said. Data drives decisions by local governments with WMSRDC's help to make road improvements. Kuhn said her staff drives 3,100 miles of roads a year that can benefit from federal funding. They're not just out for a joy ride; they are evaluating roads based on a well-regarded system called PACER (Pavement, Surface Evaluation and Rating) which uses a 1-10 scale. Erin said in Muskegon County, of the 1,100 miles of road recently surveyed the results were 33.52 % Good, 41.67 % Fair and 24.82 % Poor. "We know how to get a road from a '3' to a '7' and how much it is going to cost," Kuhn said. This helps improve a community's chance of getting state and federal grants for road projects because "there's a lot of data behind those orange barrels." WMSRDC's roles in economic development are many. While not well known, nearly all the local industrial parks developed in the last 40 plus years have been with WMSDRC's assistance in getting federal and state infrastructure grants. For example, Muskegon Community College's \$2.6 million grant for the downtown Sturrus Center was the largest such grant provided nationally in 2014, Kuhn said. Up in Hart, the city is receiving its third round of funding from the federal Economic Development Administration to help enlarge its wastewater treatment plant. WMSRDC was just one of more than 60 U.S. regional planning

organizations to receive a 30-month economic development Fellow through the federal government. Now about halfway through her fellowship, Kuhn said Annika Gacnik is helping identify opportunities for West Michigan's large agricultural economy. She said West Michigan is second only the California in specialty crops, and improving this sector of the ag-economy is a focus of Gacnik's work. "We see it as untapped potential for West Michigan and we're really excited to have her here."



Restoring Muskegon Lake is a very visible aspect of WMSRDC's work. As part of the decades long effort to "delist" Muskegon Lake as an federal environmental "Area of Concern," WMSRDC has provided staff since the early 2000s to the volunteer led Muskegon Lake Watershed Partnership.

"As part of this process we have had \$112 million come into the community to clean up Muskegon Lake and address 9 beneficial use impairments," Kuhn said. The work


has included restoring 84 acres of wetlands, 5 miles of restored or softened shoreline, 125 acres of sawmill debris and fill removed, and 51 acres of open water wetlands restored. Based on economic impact studies done by Grand Valley State University, Kuhn said, the return on investment for these improvements has been 6 to 1.

"These dollars helped us meet those benchmarks to 'delist' Muskegon Lake," she said. The impairments have all been resolved and now the community is just waiting on an official announcement from Washington that the cleanup is complete. A community celebration will be forthcoming, she said. Another project familiar to Rotarians is the microforest on Marquette Avenue near U.S. 31. WMSRDC acted as the fiduciary for administering several grants that helped get this project off the ground, literally! Awaiting that Muskegon Lake "delisting" announcement is among the many uncertainties WMSRDC staff has encountered in the past several weeks with all the news and changes out of Washington, D.C. Kuhn said it's important to steer clear of politics but the decisions coming out of Washington have WMSRDC staffers busy looking at possible impacts to programs already anticipated or scheduled. About 80 percent of the funds administered by WMSRDC come from the federal government.

"We've done a number of analyses with different scenarios" since the pause on federal funding in late January, Kuhn said. In this current fiscal year, there are \$10 million worth of non-transportation projects

either underway or in the pipeline that could be affected by federal program cuts. On the transportation side, the amount of financial impact may be as high as \$70 million in federal funds "not coming to our community," she said.

"When you think about it, it's over \$85 million that's just our little piece of the world. Just West Michigan and our five-county agency," Kuhn said. "There's a lot of unknowns. We work with a lot of partners at the federal level and we know some of them are gone, they've been laid off...we've got our seatbelts on and figuring out what we're going to do."

On April 15, 2025, at the Frauenthal Center, a coalition of agencies that provide services to the disability community will host a screening of


