

Presenter: Mark Eisenbarth Introduced by: Dave Alexander RIM Reporter: Susan Besteman

Our speaker and fellow Rotarian, Mark Eisenbarth, is a Kansas native and earned his Bachelor's degree from Emporia State University before his Master's in Environmental Science from the University of Kansas. After nine years in Topeka and five years in Garden City, Mark moved to Muskegon in 2004 to accept a position as the Deputy Director of **Muskegon County Natural Resources** and Recovery Center. In 2014, he was appointed as County Administrator where he continues to serve today.

With so many departments, Mark narrowed down the message to three active projects and four initiatives.



Active Project #1:

Our airport has a new entrance, new security, and additional restrooms after security now. Denver Air has been very successful with only one cancellation this winter. They also are receiving a grant with Manistee to do a flight to Milwaukee International Airport where they have Delta, American, Southwest, United and several other options as well. This will be a test to see how well this is received for future planning.



Active Project #2:

Our Hall of Justice had renovations on the sixth floor and a courtroom on the fourth floor as well (Mark gave kudos to Erhardt Construction on the nice work). Mark's first trivia question was how many current judges do we have in our Hall of Justice? The correct answer: eleven.



Active Project #3:

Muskegon County Resource Recovery Center has a new wastewater system pipeline from Coopersville. Because of our unique treatment system here in Muskegon County, this new pipeline gave a problem treatment process a solution. This PVC pipe is thicker than a \$5 bill and ranges from 27"-30" in diameter. This is expected to be up and running by the end of 2026 and will keep many good economic opportunities here in West Michigan.



New County Initiatives:

- Housing Coordinator
- Sustainability Coordinator
- Sustainability Advisory Committee
- Parks Commission

There were a number of reasons for the first county initiative of hiring our new Housing Coordinator, Jennifer Hodges. Studies showed that more buyers are moving into Muskegon County due to the location and also the increase in jobs available now (Cytiva, Rollon Corp, Howmet Aerospace, etc.). Jennifer is the point person to assist in finding places to put more houses and finding solutions for affordable housing including the Neighborhood Enterprise Zones Act, reducing lot widths and zoning reform, process streamlining, and finding attainable housing ordinances.

The second county initiative was hiring our Sustainability Coordinator, Sara Cooper, to increase building energy efficiency, renewable energy, recycling and composting programs, vehicle efficiency, reduced water consumption and improve wastewater efficiency.

The third county initiative of a Sustainability Advisory Committee was also recently appointed and now up and running. This committee consists of nine members appointed by the Muskegon County Board of Commissioners and they are looking to partner with other organizations with similar goals (i.e. Muskegon Rotary).

The fourth county initiative was the Muskegon County Parks Commission. They've had a couple of meetings that resulted in two projects at the forefront: Dune Harbor Park and Heritage Landing. Dune Harbor Park

has the north side which is about 3 years behind the south side in preservation of natural vegetation. The south side already has a beautiful trail and available for people to already visit but the Muskegon County Parks Commission is looking to expand on the natural beauty experience.



The north side is looking at their opportunities including an option for a camping area (moving Fisherman's Landing campground there), wooden bridges for trails over the water areas, or other potential ideas. Get your

Heritage Landing is also on their radar with great potential for a better way to serve our community.



How will people remember Muskegon when they exit the cruise ship? Mark stated, "We've had a company wanting to do a 20-year contract with Muskegon for their cruise ship to be here for the next twenty years" so they designed the below concept with that in mind.



The City of Muskegon is also working with Muskegon County Parks Commission on Heritage Landing with several public meetings.

Braver Angels



Cathy Brubaker-Clarke thanked Rotarians for attending the recent Braver Angels event, and said there will be similar events later this year.

The PeaceBuilder Committee hosted the Braver Angel's Workshop, "Bridging the Political Divide" on March 21. Although many were nervous prior to the workshop. the overwhelming feeling expressed at the conclusion is that everyone felt safe sharing their ideas and thoughts and finding common ground even among our differences. The workshop goals were to learn about the experiences, feelings, and beliefs of those on the other side of the political divide, discover areas of commonality in addition to differences, and gain insights that might be helpful to others in helping to depolarize our community. In the first session, the Reds and Blues divided into their own groups and each discussed what they thought the others believed about them, narrowing the topics down to three. For example, the Reds might believe the Blues stereotype them as "anti-science" and the Blues might believe the Reds stereotype them as "socialist". Participants were quick to point out that although some of these labels are true of some people on each side, they are certainly not true of everyone. Another session asked each "side" to talk about the values they held that were good for the Country, and then what some reservations and concerns are about some of the values they hold. There is a second half to "Bridging the Political Divide" that centers more on "common ground" and how we may all be able to work together to

accomplish good in our community and country. The participants are looking forward to being involved in the next session and plan to invite others to join, as well. At a future meeting, the PeaceBuilder Committee will be discussing when this workshop will be held. We are thankful to Braver Angels, and our moderators, Jim and Cathy, as well as Wheelfish for hosting us.


Brad Hastings reminded the Club of the upcoming Crip Camp showing April 15 at the Frauenthal Theatre.

Public Screening of Crip Camp at the Frauenthal Theater

On April 15, 2025, at the Frauenthal Center, a coalition of agencies that provide services to the disability community will host a screening of the award-winning documentary Crip Camp: A Disability Revolution. This film chronicles the origins of the disability civil rights movement. highlighting the activism that paved the way for disability civil rights legislation and continued advocacy for accessibility and inclusion today. We will begin with a reception in the lobby at 5:30 p.m., offering attendees an opportunity to connect with local organizations, enjoy complimentary hors d'oeuvres, and access a cash bar. Nonprofit exhibitors will share information and resources that are available to the Muskegon community.

The screening of *Crip Camp* will begin at 6:30 p.m., followed by a facilitated discussion featuring members of the local disability community.

This event is about more than just watching a film—it is about fostering dialogue, raising awareness, and inspiring action, Crip Camp tells a powerful story of advocacy and resilience, and we hope it will spark important conversations about disability rights, accessibility, and opportunities in Muskegon.

Community members, advocates, employers, educators, and policymakers are encouraged to attend and engage in this important discussion. 
