This Week's Program: Celebrating Harbor Hospice & Poppen Residence Presenters: Ammy Seymour and Susan Houseman Introduced by: Roger Morgenstern



Roger Morgenstern introduces our program speakers from **Harbor Hospice**.

Roger Morgenstern introduced our program today. Roger is Chairmen of the Board at Harbor Hospice. Ammy Seymour is the director of development and communications at Harbor Hospice. Susan Houseman serves as president and CEO of Harbor House and Harbor Palliative Care.



Susan Houseman from **Harbor Hospice** talks about the multitude of services they offer.

Susan and Ammy are both Rotarians. Today, they shared the impact that Harbor House provides for children and families impacted by serious health issues. Susan noted that they are divided into four sections: Harbor Palliative Care, The Leila and Cyrus Poppen Hospice Residence, Harbor Hospice, and the Bob and Merle Scolnik Healing Center.

At the Healing Center, professionals assist individuals with grief counseling and provide support groups. These services are free of charge. The Healing Center meets individuals where they are and walk alongside them during their grief journey. Children and adults are welcome at the Healing Center. Camp Courage is at Pioneer Trails and helps children honor the ones they lost; children share their feelings with other campers and skilled counselors. This three-day healing experience allows children to truly work through their grief and ask the challenging and why questions. Camp Courage sponsors approximately 45 youth each year, costs only an application fee of \$10 (can be waived as needed) and helps youth establish connections to others who have also experienced grief and loss.

The Poppen House allows individuals to reside in their home for up to six months while receiving holistic services for their physical, psychosocial and spiritual needs in a home like setting versus dying in a hospital. Harbor Hospice is celebrating the 20-year anniversary of the Poppen Hospice Residence. Many hospice patients move to Poppen when their care becomes too complex for family to continue to care for them at home. The Poppen House is the only residence (14 rooms) along the lakeshore. It is supported by contributions and donors. Poppen House provides quality and highly skilled care for residents.

Community support has been the cornerstone for Harbor Hospice. It was built by the community for the community. On June 26 and 27, 2025 the Harbor Hospice Poppen House will be providing tours and cordially invite us to take a tour of the home and to learn more about the Poppen Campaign. The Poppen Campaign needs to raise \$1,000,000 for infrastructure upgrades to the Poppen House, including a new roof, hot water tank, commercial kitchen upgrades and new hospital beds.
