Hillary Scholten


Opening her remarks with humor, Representative Scholten asked, "Since there is not much happening in Washington this week, what will I talk about?" While she wished the House was in session so that members could continue working for the people, she values her community time to meet with her constituents. She noted that the spirit and values of Rotary serve as a

good example of what is needed in Washington now.

Congresswoman Scholten then introduced herself to the audience, telling them she was born and raised in West Michigan. Her parents were exemplars of community service, which led her to pursue a degree in sociology and a career as a social worker, focusing on issues of housing and homelessness. She went on to earn a Juris Doctor degree from the University of Maryland's Thurgood Marshal School of Law. She clerked for the U.S. Court of Appeals for the Second Circuit, followed by work in the Department of Justice through the Attorney General's Honor Program under the Obama administration.

Returning to West Michigan in 2017, Ms. Scholten first ran for office in 2020 but was unsuccessful. In 2022, she was elected to office as the Representative for Michigan's Third District; she is the first woman to hold this position and was reelected to the House of Representatives in 2024. Representative Scholten serves on the Transportation and Infrastructure subcommittees on Aviation, Water Resources and Environment, and Coast Guard and Maritime Transportation. Additionally, she serves on the Small Business subcommittees on Innovation, Entrepreneurship, and Workforce Development, Contracting and Infrastructure, Rural Development, Energy, and Supply Chains. She chose to serve on this committee because it addresses the diverse needs of her

District and the 99% of businesses in West Michigan that fall under the mantle of small businesses. The Congresswoman serves as the Vice Ranking Member on Water Resources and **Environment Subcommittee and** the Ranking Member on the Innovation, Entrepreneurship, and Workforce Development Subcommittee. Ms. Scholten was elated to attend the ceremonial delisting of Muskegon Lake and celebrate the return of the lake to its "... full and beautiful purpose," highlighting the years of work that demonstrate what we can accomplish when we work together.



Despite the deep divides in Congress, Representative Scholten stated that she is committed to open dialogue. She joined every bipartisan group in Congress, including the Problem Solvers Caucus, Third Way, and No Labels organizations that bring people together across party lines, stating, "Partnerships for the common good will show us the way." Representative Scholten strongly disagrees that violence is the answer to our problems. She closed her remarks by noting that Rotary shows us the way—service above self-interest, dialogue versus division, and purpose over politics.

Questions from the Audience

Ms. Scholten opened the rest of her time for questions from our Rotary audience. Four Muskegon Rotarians had questions; the first question came from Kevin Donovan, who had a question about Congress' inability to pass a budget on time. The following questions came from Karen Kekelik, who asked about the loopholes in the 2024 farm bill regarding the proliferation of intoxicating hemp products, and Marcia Hovey-Wright asked a question about why the government cannot keep operating under the current budget while Congress is trying to adopt a budget for the next fiscal year. The final question came from Michelle Gravlin, who asked about addressing the financial impacts on rural hospitals, Trinity Health Muskegon, and Trinity Health across Michigan. Representative Scholten answered these questions by reviewing the Democratic Party's positions on the budget impasse and the work to bridge the gap with the Republican Party's positions to reach a consensus on the budget.





Second Muskegon Microforest – Volunteers Needed!


