Pioneer Resources Presenters: Jill Bonthuis and Greg Sischo

Jill and Greg shared a video on the history of Pioneer Resources and their 70 years of serving the Muskegon community. Their mission is to help people with disabilities and seniors attain independence and dignity by creating opportunities for participation in the community.

In the late 1940's, the pastor of Black Creek Church in Muskegon noticed that one couple in his congregation never attended services together. When asked why, the couple shared that they had a child with disabilities at home who required full-time care, so they took turns attending church. The pastor encouraged this couple to connect with other families in the congregation who had a child with a disability. Over time, these families

formed the Pioneer Association, operating the first special education school-Pioneer School in the basement of Bethany Church, to building what is now the eastern educational center on Wesley, providing education and therapy to children with disabilities. Riding therapy, building group homes to move persons out of the correctional facility, operating the coastline deli at as a training program, operating the galley kitchen on the lake express, today offering transportation to beach shuttle, to workers on the cruise ships coming to Muskegon, a community partner and business in the city of Muskegon provided service in Muskegon and Ottawa County. Throughout the incarnations of the school, they made efforts to ensure that children and families were served, and their focus was to provide access for living, learning, growing and playing and transportation. 85% of their funding comes from Medicaid and Medicare. They are primary a healthcare provider and do have many community partners that provide support for the children and families in the great West Michigan Area.




They focus on quality outcomes for persons with specific care needs. A place to live is affordable and specialized homes for persons with

disabilities. They provide vocational training, ABA therapies and other community living supports. A way to get there provides specialized transportation services, a fleet of 85 vehicles most of which are wheelchair accessible.

A place to grow and play are creating specialized programs that allow persons to participate in outdoor activities. The Pioner Trails property has 138 years of history, and its mission is to create care and placement for neglected children and adults.







The camp was formed by Muskegon businesses to create a lodge at Blue Lake and was originally

called the Home of the Friendless and led by the Home of the Friendless. The Blue Lake Club build the Monroe Lodge and cottages on 90 acres on Big Blue Lake. These cottages continue to remain today. The camp was eventually Camp Emery. In 1921, Blue Lake Club sold 80 acres to the Muskegon Human Union for \$15,000 becoming the Children's Home Health Camp for undernourished youth. This home was supported by Rotary and other civic groups and operated under the Muskegon Children's Home. Camp Emery slowly began to serve more children. In 1991 Pioneer Resources purchased the property from Rotary. YWCA managed the camp for Pioneer Resources. In 1996 the name was officially changed to Pioneer Trails. It was during this time that great growth and diversity occurred. The camp served over 2,300 people each season prior to the COVID 19 pandemic and now serves 1,500 each summer.








Assistant Sargent-At-Arms Position Filled

lunch each week.


