#### Shoreline Trails and **Greenways (STAG) Plan**

Shoreline Trails and Greenways (STAG) Plan is a trails plan to make multiuser trail connections



along the shoreline. The project mapped ways to connect existing



regional paths and add more local access options to get to both scenic places (waterways, parks, greenways) and

everyday places (stores, banks, work). The long-term goal is equitable access to trails and amenities.



The project area includes the city of Muskegon, Muskegon County, and Northwestern Ottawa County. The

project began with a grassroots effort to gather information from multiple communities and focus groups to guide the plan. The business case for the trail improvements is built on significant economic benefits, improved community health, and a higher quality of life for residents.

The vision for the plan is that the Shoreline Region (Muskegon and Northwest Ottawa Counties) will be linked together by a robust network of trails and greenways that connects communities, enriches the health and livelihood of residents, and provides abundant access to everyday destinations and natural areas alike. Information gathered identified existing conditions as well as community input on what improvements are needed, and which are most desired/important. This qualitative data came from focus groups, community events, online survey, and pop-up events that raised over 800 voices. Focus groups included urbanized areas (City of Muskegon, Muskegon Heights, Muskegon Lakeshore Chamber of Commerce, and Muskegon Lake Watershed Partnership Public Access) and regional groups including biking groups, outdoor groups, conservation groups, regional businesses, and local pocket groups.

Community Events — SWOC ANALYSIS FEEDBACK

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Putting that feedback into categories – SWOC analysis- helped categorize current strengths, opportunities for the future, what needs improvement, and challenges that must be considered.

Of course, when there are multiple needs or a large project, prioritization

must be done to determine where to begin and perhaps phase in other parts of the project over time. The goal of all the work so far was to get the project funding ready. Are there Capital Improvement Plans already in place that can be adapted to include portions of this project? What grant funding streams may be available for the project? Are the private donors who may be interested in funding portions of the project?

There is a 15-year plan for implementing the entirety of the project. There were two important final messages:

- What is to come is better than what has been
- We represent what the future can be.


#### The Big Read Lakeshore



#### PeaceBuilder Committee "Family & Politics" Workshop on Oct 10<sup>th</sup> Update



Just in time for the holidays, the Rotary PeaceBuilder Committee hosted a Braver Angels workshop titled "Family & Politics" on October 10<sup>th</sup> at Wheelfish. Braver Angel's moderators were Jim Distelrath and Terry Donahue Cousins.



The session offered valuable guidance on how to preserve family bonds while staying true to one's values and political beliefs. Participants explored the common roles family members take in political discussions—gladiator, defender, instigator, peacekeeper, bystander, and engager—and practiced constructive strategies for navigating differences.



One attendee shared, "I've always felt like the bystander, not wanting to promote or participate in potential political conflict. However, with the strategies we practiced, I now feel that I can engage with family members in a constructive, non-threatening way." ## International Exchange Student Conference


November 8th at Hackley Library, we'll be hosting an International Exchange Student Conference.


