## Last Week's Program A Category of One: Branding Rotary in Our Community by Lee Coggin

"Rotary is no longer a household name," according to Rotary Zone leader Mary Berge, right, who visited Rotary this week to assist with strategic planning and to address the Club's weekly lunch meeting. Berge, a member of the Johnstown, Pennsylvania, Rotary Club, reported on Rotary's global efforts to strengthen its brand and refine its messaging, so the Club can accomplish its mission for many years to come.

To develop a plan to address what Berge called an "identity crisis" both externally and internally, Rotary International has hired a marketing firm to help guide the organization's branding efforts. Step one was to determine who we are, what we do, and why we do it. Regardless of where Berge travels, she said the answers are the same when she asks what Rotary is all about: service, networking, community, fellowship, friendship, LUNCH!

The marketing firm conducted extensive surveys and determined that there is no other service club like Rotary. In fact, they identified Rotary as existing in a "category of one." The firm found that Rotary provides a unique value proposition

and the communities it serves by providing hands-on service opportunities, trusted connections among members, and life-long friendships. Rotary has a clear niche of bringing together leaders who use their expertise to take on the toughest challenges in their communities.

With the survey data, Rotary has defined its voice with a unique tone. It is smart by applying the expertise of its members; it is compassionate because it takes on the tough issues that intimidate others, like ending polio throughout the world, and it is persevering because it provides a lasting impact.

Berge encouraged the members to use this unique Rotary voice to tell their own stories and create enthusiasm for Rotary's mission. The Muskegon Rotary Club is positioned to do this successfully, according to Berge. Following the strategic planning meeting with Club leaders and members, Berge said the Muskegon Rotary Club is good at engaging new members, being flexible, and providing strong leadership that is not stuck in old traditions.

Reaching out to the younger generation will be challenging but not impossible. Berge said young adults are looking for hands-on projects that produce an immediate positive impact. They want to involve their children in these projects as well. Furthermore, they are heavily invested in social media and may prefer shorter weekly meetings that are sensitive to the time constraints they face with family and job responsibilities.

Likewise, Rotary needs to do a better job of keeping new members. A decade ago, Rotary had 1.2 million members globally. Since then, Rotary has added 1.2 million new members. Yet, today its total membership remains at only 1.2 million. Retention is an obvious challenge for Rotary to address.

One of the Muskegon Club members asked if service clubs are fading away in the American landscape. The answer: not for many years to come if Mary Berge and Rotary have anything to say about it.
