Last Week's Program

Schooner Sculpture Story by Peg Maniates

A unique piece of Muskegon's history will be immortalized in steel in downtown Muskegon.

Steve Olsen introduced last week's

presenters as John and Barb Hermanson. right, and told those assembled that the Hermansons would speak about a new sculpture being commission ed for Muskegon. But, he said,

today's presentation would be more aptly titled as "What passionate people do when they show up."

John Hermanson played a short historical video Muskegon's Lyman B. Davis schooner. This ship was commissioned and built in Muskegon, with the purpose of hauling wood to reconstruct Chicago after the fire of 1871. Lyman Mason and Charles Davis, owners

of the Mason Lumber Company, commissioned the construction of the schooner at the end of Pine Street near the current Muskegon Fire Department's downtown station and Hot Rod Harley Davidson shop on Terrace Street. At that time, the shore of Muskegon Lake came up roughly where Western Avenue is

now, Hermanson said. She was launched in 1873 and later was said to be the fastest and most graceful of the thousand-plus schooners that worked the Great Lakes, and it sailed proudly for decades.

After many years of use, she was sold to

a Canadian company in 1912 and continued to deliver cargo for another 20

years. Her demise came in 1934, when she was set aflame for the amusement of theme park guests.

John and Barb decided her history should be remembered in Muskegon and began a campaign to erect a statue in downtown Muskegon in her memory. John stated, "To celebrate that history, we want to add to the beauty of our new downtown by erectina a commemorative scul pture in the traffic circle that leads to Terrace Point and Parkland Properties' magnificent new residential development on

Muskegon Lake – Terrace Point Landing. The sculpture will be named "Sails Ablaze."

To date, the couple has raised \$100,000 of the \$144,000 needed for completion. Tax-deductible donations may be made online at www.cffmc.org, click on "Give Online" at the top of the home page, then "List of Funds," then category "L," page 3.

The sculpture is being created by Steve Andersen of Cedar Springs. Mr. Anderson's other work includes a piece called Shields on display at the Tanger Outlets in Grand Rapids, works in North Rockford Middle School, the Rockford Rogue River Dam, and in many other public locations throughout the state.
