Last Week's Program Medical Teams Travel to Peru with Rotary's Help by Lee Coggin

In the mountains of northern Peru, at the Amazon River basin, lies the isolated city of lquitos, population 371,000. lquitos is only accessible by boat or air, and its citizens rarely have access to medical care. Many of its citizens have never seen a physician and many of its women have delivered multiple babies without the assistance of an OB-GYN.

That is why Michigan State's College of Medicine has sponsored the Peru Medical Service Project for seven years. Dr. Chris Rogalla, an alumni of Rotary International's Youth Exchange program, made a return visit to the Muskegon Club this week to report on the success and needs of the Project. Chris is no stranger to Muskegon, having been sponsored by the Club for his trip to Finland as an exchange student several years ago.



donations and the district providing matching grant monies. The Muskegon and Traverse City clubs were the first to provide support to the project. To date, the district clubs have donated \$22,000 and an additional \$6,000 is expected by year's end. This exceeds the goal of \$19,000, and Chris said the excess dollars will allow the Project to establish a year-



Chris maintains his international service focus as a medical professional by working closely with the Peru Project. Rotary District 6290 has also taken an interest in this project with several clubs providing round clinic in Peru.

Chris will leave soon for a two week service trip to Peru with 31 students and 27 physicians representing a variety of medical specialties. In Peru, Chris and the team will travel up and down the Amazon, left, to numerous

villages where they will take medical histories, conduct physicals, and refer patients to experts travelling with the team. They expect to see close to 2,000 patients.

In its seven-year history, the Peru project has seen close to 9,000 patients and delivered medical supplies valued at \$1 million. But, Chris is quick to point out that they were able to purchase the supplies at a reduced rate due to the medical school's connections and status as a non-profit organization. The group will also engage in research while in Peru. Several research projects will investigate the genetic link between glaucoma

and the Peruvian population and the reason for the high level of anemia in Peru. Of course, it's not too early to begin talking about 2016. Participants can come from the Club itself or the Rotaract and Interact clubs. Toothpaste and every day hygiene items are needed, and



they are especially in need of dentists. Of course, financial donations remain vital. The participants all pay their own way and transport

supplies in checked luggage. This ensures that all donations go to the Peruvians.

Chris will be happy to talk to interested volunteers. And, he assured us that you don't even have to know how to speak Spanish to help!
