

Last Week's Program Rotary Park Coming Along by Frank Marczak





Nancy Crandall stayed at the podium to give an update about the soon-to-be Rotary Park located adjacent to the former YMCA located on Western Avenue. In 2007, during a visioning session of Club members, the idea of a Rotary designated park was born. A fund development plan was created and, between 2005 and 2008, a 1.9-acre parcel of land adjacent to the YMCA was purchased with monies generated by this Rotary Club. Gary Ostrom and Nancy Crandall led the charge and results were very positive. The eventual plan was to join with the county to purchase the land, develop the park, and eventually deed it to the county. The firm of Hooker-DeJong was designated as the architectural firm to design the park. It will

eventually contain walking and bike trails, a fishing pier to which



Howmet has donated funds, picnic areas, and signage designating the area as Muskegon Rotary Park.

Bob Lukens, above, Director of the Convention and Visitors Bureau, and many other functions for the county, described the land makeover plan designed in 2013. But estimated costs for construction came in very high and the plan went back to the drawing board.

Rotary Park Groundbreaking, October 2013

In early 2015, a redesigned plan resulted in a less costly development and the Alcoa Foundation donated monies for the picnic areas and restrooms. As a result, the work for park construction was issued to Muskegon Quality Builders. Construction on the remaining

part of the park will begin this spring. Kudos to all who donated and shepherded this project to fruition. A big round of applause for Nancy, Gary and Bob who have worked tirelessly behind the scenes to make it happen.
