

The unprecedented number of opioid overdoses has health officials often working around the clock to raise awareness and save lives by passing out a free life-saving drug...

"We've seen a five-fold increase in overdose deaths since 1999 and that's fairly similar in the surrounding communities including Ottawa, Kent, and Allegan," said Brandon Hool, Overdose Prevention Program Manager for The Red Project of Muskegon. "In 2015 alone, Muskegon County saw nearly 300 overdoses requiring the use of Naloxone, according to the Professional Med Team, Inc. Health officials are now fighting what they're calling an epidemic.

Leading Thursday's session will be County Prosecutor **DJ Hilson** and Muskegon Police Chief **Jeff Lewis**.





Muskegon Area Promise

Dr John Severson, MAISD Superintendent, introduced our speaker, Megan Byard-Karaba. Megan was hired in August, 2012, as a College Access Specialist. In her position with the MAISD and Muskegon Opportunity (LCAN Coordinator), she provides local districts, students and their families with the tools, knowledge, information and resources needed to Start, Stay and Succeed in college. Additionally, she works to oversee and implement the new "game changer" college access scholarship program titled the Muskegon Area Promise.

Megan, left, has been a professional and resident within Muskegon County for nearly 21 years. In these years she has been



afforded the opportunity and experience in careers such as middle school teaching, adult and alternative education coordination, and supervision of instructional services for community education.

Ms Byard-

Karaba, above, obtained her bachelor's degree in education from Western Michigan University and her master's degree in education from Grand Valley State University. Megan is married with 6 children, 1 dog, and 1 cat.

he Muskegon Area Promise is a post high school scholarship that provides the financial assistance necessary to obtain a two-year degree or its equivalent when used in conjunction with federal, state and/or institutional grants. It is operated and managed by a designated statewide Promise Zone in partnership with Muskegon Community College and Baker College of Muskegon. It is an opportunity for ALL students with a 3.5 GPA who live in and graduate from a qualifying high school located within MAISD boundaries

In 2009, state law approved 10 Promise Zones to expand educational opportunities by providing scholarships to students, to build a skill-based workforce, and to transform communities. Muskegon County was the FIRST and ONLY regional Promise Zone serving more than one school district. In recent years, Jackson lost its designation as a Zone. It was replaced by Newaygo County RESA Promise Zone. In November, 2017, our state governor signed into law expansion of the Promise Zones from 10 to 15. The new FIVE will be named in the coming months of 2018.

The Muskegon Area Promise is legally governed by a Promise Zone Authority Board. The Promise Zone legislation defines that for the first two years scholarships must be funded with private contributions. After two years, A Promise Zone can capture HALF of the revenue growth from the regional state education tax leading to a self-funding model.

The Promise was only a dream until the private and corporate investments of over one million dollars flowed in to make it a reality. Hines Corporation, Nichols, Adac Automotive and the Alcoa Foundation stepped up with the first \$100,000 level gifts and were followed closely with identical gifts from Quality Tool &

Stamping, Verplank Trucking Company, the Dan & Sheryl Kuznar Family, and the Community Foundation for Muskegon County. Supreme Machined Products - \$50K, Parkland Properties of Michigan - \$30K, Webb Chemical Service Corp. - \$25.2K, Muskegon Rotary Foundation - \$20K, and MasterTag, Inc. - \$10K. Their investments and so many others all add up to directly benefit our families who live and work here, and build on our economic vitality.

It's important to know the difference between an
unweighted GPA and a weighted GPA. Many
schools report both.

Students must be "degree seeking" declared students at either institution, not "guest students:. All scholarships expire after four years from student's graduation.

The scholarship is a last dollar award. Any unused money will stay in our investment accounts to benefit future Promise Schools. 64% of current Promise Scholars are awarded dollars ranging fm \$1.00 – a full Scholarship

The value of the scholarship increases with the prevailing rate and costs of our Community College Tuition and fees for up to 32 credits per year, up to an additional 10 contact hours and fees per year as needed, and a \$500.00 b*oak allowance are included. 62 credits, the equivalent of an Associate Degree, is the maximum amount covered.

Fees for exploratory classes such as study abroad may not be covered by the Promise award. Students should confirm the allowance with Financial Aid prior to enrolling.

The value of the scholarship is based on "in county" tuition rates at our local Community College. In the event a student's residence is out of county (Ottawa, Newaygo or Oceana), higher rates will be charged. Currently, out of county rates are \$91.00 per credit hour higher than the in county rate. This difference/deficit is currently not covered by the Promise award.

Financial Responsibility

The Promise Board and our investors expect students to be financially responsible with their awards. Students are encouraged to:

*Maintain residency in county.

*Meet often with College Counselors to ensure programs of study are on track.

*Monitor annual credit accumulation and plan for necessary adjustments.

*Monitor book allowances and spending. Buy early, buy used, rent and return.

*Attend required orientations planned by colleges (Parent information Night, New

Students Orientation, Jayhawk Journey and/or BC1010)

*Apply for, and seek, other financial resources to assist in any unforeseen costs.

Why should we work to make the Promise a success?

*To enhance our school's academic and college going culture to increase the number of Students earning Promise scholarships.

*To increase educated, skilled, ready-to-work, local talent.

*To grow existing business & attract new business.

*To strengthen Muskegon County's brand.

*To ignite opportunity for post-secondary learning and

*To promote partnership for any financial commitment/investment available.

Other Promise programs have seen increased K-12 enrollment, more chance to keep students in district, better student behavior, better attendance and GPA, grades 3-8 success gains on state tests in Math and ELA, benefits have persisted of multiple years, with system-wide impact and culture change.

Outside of the Promise students have options to get free college credit with direct/concurrent credit, early college for Muskegon County, dual enrollment, advanced placement, and the Muskegon Area Career Tech Center.
