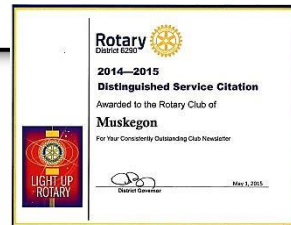

Members had plenty of questions about the purchase of fair trade clothing items, "thrifting" as a way of maintaining a good wardrobe, and pro-active things

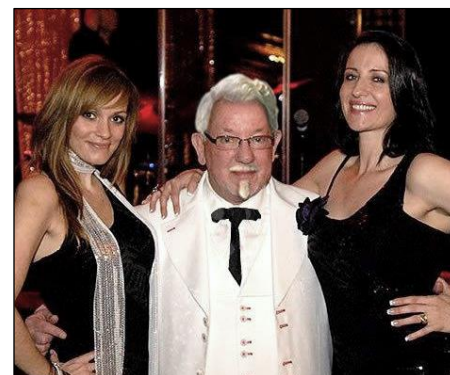


one can do to purchase good clothing wisely. She recom

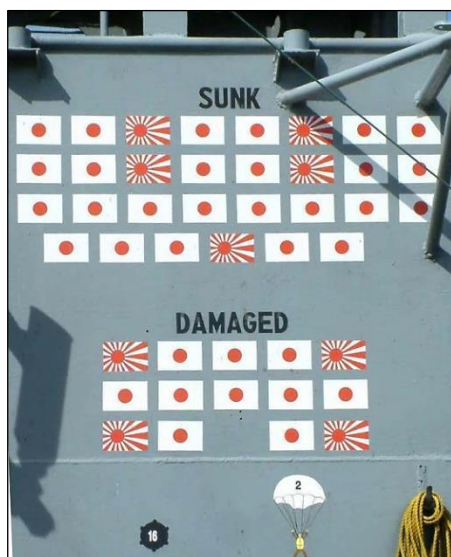

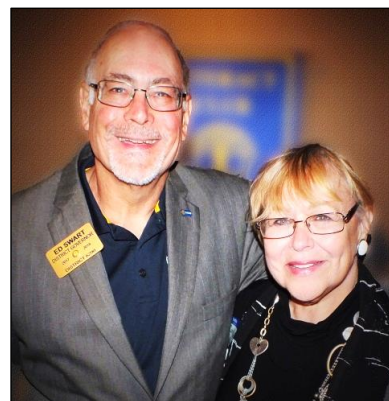


USS Silversides, above, performed an engine start on May 18, the first such start of the season. Have a look:

Speakers: Randy Lindquist, John Noling, Lee Coggin et al.

Randy Lindquist, right, introduced the Mona Shores, North Muskegon and Orchard View Interact club students. All three groups have applied for and are expected to receive a Rotary Presidential Citation this year.

Fundraisers were plentiful with all three clubs to include \$5,000 raised through Get Your Chili On, money that would be used for student trips to Honduras and El Salvador to build water filters, and install latrines. Mona Shores hosted InterArt to raise money for The Hope Project and the Color Run for Kids' Food Basket and The Hope Project. All three schools raised money with Purple Pinkies for Polio, and North Muskegon had awareness for Mental Health Day to promote kindness and encourage kindness in people around you. They collected and wrapped Christmas gifts for other anonymous class-mates whose families could not afford to purchase gifts. They sponsored a child in the Dominican named Midan who is turning five years old. They had a student

attend the World Peace Conference. Their Middle School Interact members raised money with the White Caps to build fields in the inner cities. The Norton Shores club sold tickets to raise money for Big Brothers and Big Sisters. Orchard View Interact, in its first year, sent two students to the Leadership Conference, raised money for homelessness, had a food drive, worked with The Hope Project, and helped three



Lee Coggin. They are Presidential Citation qualified for the 4th consecutive year. A major lesson learned, they feel, is when you invest in others, others want to invest in you. They participated in The Boys and Girls Club students go to El Salvador.

Baker's Rotaractors, below, worked the Great Futures Gala, *Grape Escape*, Rotary's *Parties in the Park*, Build Your Burger, and Help End Polio. They are Presidential Citation qualified for a 4^h consecutive year, participated in Adopt a Highway, Kids' Food Basket, the Multi-District Conference in Cadillac, Rake Off with Muskegon Community College, Honduras Trip, World Peace Conference, and in Habitat for Humanity.

The entire student presentation was impressive, standing ovation impressive.

Annette grew up in Muskegon County and was very involved in 4H and the Girl Scouts. She lived and worked on a farm in Norton Shores. She has been married to Navy veteran Everett Smedley for 37 years. They have six children, three of whom they adopted, and 15 total



grandchildren. Annette, above, served as both a Girl Scout and a Boy Scout Leader for over five years while raising her children. She and Everett were foster parents and in 2003 received the Michigan Adoptive Family of the Year Award.

While attending the Thomas Cooley Law School, Annette worked in factories, restaurants and managed her household. She worked for the U.S. Attorney's Office and the Muskegon Prosecutor's office plus she has worked as a district and circuit court public defender. She operated her own practice for 10 years and was a criminal defense attorney and Public Defender during that time. She handled several very high profile cases while serving as a public defender receiving high marks from the legal community. In 2012, Anette was elected the first female Circuit Court Judge in Muskegon County.
