# The YMCA: Building a Healthy Future for Muskegon

Rotarians **Bruce Spoelman** and **Jason Piasecki** shared an update on the Muskegon YMCA with Rotary today.



Jason, who's serves as the Y's Chief Volunteer Officer, opened with a history of the YMCA.

The Muskegon YMCA began in 1916 as a Christian Fellowship and Gymnasium. By 1925, the Y had

become a Dormitory and Pool, which evolved into the Fitness and Family Facility on W. Western. Competing for fitness memberships in 2014, the

YMCA began a shift in focus from a facility to community outreach to meet the growing health related needs in our community.

The new hub for the YMCA is on Third Street with a focus on key health issues in Muskegon.

CEO Bruce Spoelman went on to discuss the programs offered by the YMCA including:

Safety Around Water, which is reaching 44% of Third Graders in

Muskegon. The program teaches water safety, water rescue, rip currents and ice rescue. One of the goals of the YMCA is to teach more minority children about water safety.

Diabetes Prevention Program and LIVESTRONG addressing some of Muskegon's most pressing health needs like diabetes prevention and post-cancer wellness programs.

Healthy Out of School Activities in afterschool and summer programs focused on fighting causes of childhood obesity through physical activity and nutrition coaching.

*Nutritional Programs* to teach children and adults about healthy eating.

Seaway Run as a vital partnership with Muskegon's 1 in 21.

For over 90 years, YMCA Camp Pendalouan has been offering high caliber programs and children and families will continue to enjoy the experience.

The YMCA is the largest non-profit in the nation. Their programs are evidence based, able to scale and are built facility is not required to build a healthy tomorrow.
