The Rev Stephon Ferguson treated the Muskegon Rotary Club to a surprise performance. Ferguson, who has captivated audiences of all ages worldwide, would later that day breathe life into the words of the late Dr Martin Luther King, Jr during his uplifting and inspirational performance in downtown's Frauenthal Center.

Ferguson has raised eyebrows, brought chills and tears, and aroused the consciousness of people of all ages, cultures and backgrounds by delivering deadon, pitch perfect renditions of Dr King's speeches and sermons. His mission is to share his gift with the world to help continue the legacy of Dr King by not only performing King's words, but more importantly, educating people about his philosophy of love, nonviolence, peace and unity to help bring about



positive change. Sponsored by Muskegon Community College's Center for Experiential Learning, the event was free and open to the public.

His pursuit of this goal was not easy but with a strong work ethic and perseverance, DJ reached the starting line of his career.
