ON STAGE THIS WEEK

Muskegon Prescribes Food for Health (MPFH) is a program of Community enCompass, Hackley Community Care, Pathways, Mercy Health and several other community partners. The program offers prescriptions of fruits and vegetables to qualifying patients of Hackley Community Care, largely living in the core city neighborhoods of Muskegon. Patients engage with the MPFH team to attend a 12-week session which includes bi-weekly cooking and nutritional classes, discussions and questions with physicians, and bringing their prescriptions/tokens to McLaughlin Grows Urban Farm to receive fresh fruits and vegetables. The MPFH pilot program has been offered August - October 2017. Plans are under way for a full launch in 2018 including up to 75 patients in Muskegon County.

Last Week's Program - 10/19/2017 **Muskegon County Youth Programs Millage- NOV 7th**

Alisha Riedl provided staggering Muskegon County statistics including:

- 23% of Muskegon County's population is under 18. Of those, 28% live in poverty
- 37 out of 100 youth will not graduate from high school on time
- 12,000 Youth have a mental health condition, and only 796 were receiving HealthWest (Community Mental Health) treatment in 2015
- According to an ACE study, Muskegon has a high number of childhood abuse, neglect, and family dysfunction compared to other counties in the state of Michigan and the U.S. as a whole To review report, click here)



According to Mark Cohen, Vanderbilt University (2009), "We estimate the present value of saving a 14-year-old high risk juvenile from a life of crime to range from \$2.6 to \$5.3 million."

Needs that will be met by the millage to
The millage specifics are: be voted on Nov 7th include:

- Prevention & treatment programs
- Family based programs
- School based programs
- Transitional & community aftercare
- **Employment services**
- Psychosocial Activities



Sandra Vanderhyde explained the critical need for prevention. programs, and residential placements. We used to have Child Haven; it's closed. Then we had Webster House: that closed. Now all we have is the Juvenile Detention Center. While working with the University of Cincinnati Criminal Institute to have a better assessment of youth, they are learning we cannot put low risk youth in the detention center.

This millage will provide better solutions that include:

- Increasing foster care homes & therapeutic foster care homes
- Respite care
- Crisis housing
- Residential Treatment
- Transitional Living

There is no therapeutic foster care in our county. Muskegon sends youth needing therapeutic foster care to out of the county or out of the state. When they return, they face the same family problems they left.



- 1.5 Mills (\$1.50 per \$1,000 of taxable value)
- 10 Years
- Cost of \$75 per year or \$6.25 per month for a \$100,000 home (taxable value)
- Estimated \$6,185,898 in first year



Hon. Judge Gregory C. Pittman spoke further about the biggest question asked every week, "what do we do with this young person?" Even when the answer isn't "we don't know," the next question is "how do we fund it?"

There are ways in which these institutions can work together. The juvenile justice system working with the families to over time: finding meaningful and cost effective ways to help these kids.

We can't continue to do the same things we did 30-40 years ago. We have access to so much information, and we need to use it. The Juvenile Transition Center was built to serve families and kids, but we failed to provide programs and the infrastructure to make the building work.

The major contributors of truancy are consistent for most families involved, primarily: poverty, neglect and abuse. Eaton and Ingham Counties have implemented similar programs and have successfully reduced their truancy rates by half.


