## Honduras Work Trip 2016

ealth and Humanitarian Outreach Projects (HHOP), a Rotary organization made up of four West Michigan Rotary Clubs, is hosting a work trip to Honduras from February 25 to March 5, 2016. The trip is open to all Rotarians, Interact Club members in 11th and 12th grades, and Rotaract Club members.

This 10-day trip will fly from Grand Rapids, Michigan to San Pedro Sula, Honduras. We will work with the Marendon Rotary Club delivering books that we take with us, to a school library they support. We will also deliver school uniforms to this Club for them to distribute to needy families.

Then we will travel by chartered bus to El Ayundante (EA), a Christian mission outside Comayagua. EA has bought and installed several hundred bio-sand water filters from HHOP. We will install new water filters, inspect and repair previously installed filters, and build latrines.

The trip will round out with a bus ride to Copan Ruinas, a lovely Spanish Colonial town near the Copan ruins. A guide will take us through the ruins. We will connect with the Copan Rotary Club, and if time



allows, visit some of their community projects to gain a better understanding of what Rotary is accomplishing in Honduras.

After spending a night in Copan Ruinas, we will return to San Pedro Sula and depart from there Saturday morning.

The price for this 10-day trip includes air fare from Grand Rapids, all meals, all rooms, all transportation, and entrance with a guide to the Copan ruins. Additional money would only be needed for personal shopping, such as souvenirs and alcohol at meals. The total cost is \$2250. The trip is limited to 20 people. If you desire to fly out of a different city than Grand Rapids, please call Gail Ringelberg for land costs and help with flight arrangements.

\$100 deposit is needed to hold a place on the trip. This check should be made out to HHOP and mailed to: Gail Ringelberg, 16 Lafayette Ave, Grand Haven, MI 49417. Please send by the end of October so air plane tickets can be bought. Please include with the check: full name as it appears on passport, passport number, passport expiration date, date of birth, address, phone number, email address, and emergency contact information.

## Last Week's Program Muskegon's Reputation: World Class Excellence by Jonathan Wilson



During last week's program, presenters **Dave Alexander** and **Brianna Scott** shined the spotlight on five visionary organizations and their leaders for their impact on our county, region and far beyond. Those honored represent vision, dreams, courage, grit, and the very best of community spirit—elevated to a level of excellence that is truly world class.

#### 1) The Robert B. Annis Water Resources Institute

(AWRI) is a multidisciplinary research organization within GVSU's College of Liberal Arts and Sciences. Facilities within the Lake Michigan Center

include classrooms, conference areas, analytical labs, research labs, dockage, and ship support and >>>

>>> storage. The institute also owns and operates its own research vessels, the D.J. Angus and the W.G. Jackson, below. The mission of AWRI is to integrate research, education, and outreach to enhance and preserve freshwater resources.

### 2) The Muskegon County Waste-water Management System opened in 1972—a massive, 11,000 acre facility

with the capacity to treat 43 million gallons a day. A pilot project with the EPA, the facility combined the very best of two technologies—the newly emerging mechanical treatment process and the long proven lagoon technology—making it a leading edge facility that was recognized regionally and nationally. What's especially innovative about the Muskegon County System is the integration of farmland into the treatment process.



Today, the system continues to be an excellent model for innovation in water treatment.

### 3) Michigan's Adventure is

Michigan's largest amusement and water park. The park opened in1972 as Deer Park Funland and was owned by Roger Jourden. That same year, he added the first three flat rides: Tilt-a-Whirl, Merry-Go-Round and Ferris Wheel. Every few years he would add a few more attractions. The 1988 season marked a huge transition for Deer Park Funland, most notably the introduction >>>

>>> of a new General Manager, Roger's daughter **Camille Jourden-Mark**, as well as a new name, Michigan's Adventure. Today the park remains one of Michigan's most popular attractions.

4) Howmet Alcoa Power and Propulsion, headquartered in Whitehall, is a world leader in the investment casting of super alloys, aluminum and titanium primarily for jet aircraft engines and airframes as well as industrial gas turbine (IGT) engine components. The Whitehall facility serves as the global headquarters for the company. Over the last two years, Alcoa announced a \$16.7 million expansion to its facility in Whitehall, and a \$22 million investment in Hot Isostatic Pressing (HIP) technology.

5) The Muskegon Winter Sports

**Complex**, located in Muskegon State Park, provides quality, reliable, winter recreational sports activities and programs to both Muskegon County residents and visitors to the area. It features a, 850ft luge track designed by an Olympian and is open to public. It is also used to train future Olympic athletes. Thursday  $\longrightarrow$ was 1 in 21 Big Crunch Day, and Club members all took a bite of an apple at the same time, right, attempt-

ing to top New Zealand's record bites (and others') like Muskegon County did last year.
