CHICKS DIG HIM

A few weeks back, Consumers Energy's **Rich Houtteman**, below, treated fellow Rotarians to a talk about his company's current direction. This sharp, well-imaged utility manager easily gives the impression that his is a gentle, coat-and-tie existence. Sometimes, perhaps... but not always.



A recent job challenge had Rich up a stack, banding chicks at the JH Campbell Complex in Port Sheldon Twp. With a Campbell plant employee and a DNR representative, Rich scaled 200-feet to the circular shed that encircles the stack. This shed has a few windows; behind one is a peregrine falcon nest box.

Rich shared with RIM how the banding was done: "One person took two hockey sticks with an attached sheet to be stretched over the front of the nest box to keep mom away. The DNR rep then removed the chicks, putting them into a box where they were all segregated. Of course, Mom isn't happy that she can't get back to the nest and often dive bombs the unfortunate sheet holder!

"We kept a lid on the box to keep the chicks calm, taking out one at a time for their banding, their eyes covered with a cloth. When the lid is removed, or if the chicks can see us, they shriek, and Mom gets Mom *very* excited!"

"After all of the chicks were banded, the team removed the sheet from the front of the nest and descended down the ladder in their safety harness gear, none the worse for wear and a cool story richer.



Huey Long Discussed

Last Sunday night, Merle and Bob
Scolnik attended another in The
Heartland Independent Film Forum's
series, this time the 1949 Academy
Award winning All the King's Men
starring Broderick Crawford. The film was
based on Robert Penn Warren's Pulitzer
Prize winning novel, and inspired by the
life and times of Louisiana Governor and
Senator Huey Long. Close to 100 people
attended and there was an in-depth
discussion after the film led by Muskegon
Community College Professors George
Maniates and Kurt Troutman.

All the King's Men was released in 1949 and is, I feel, as good today as any current film in spite of its being shot in black & white. Centered on politics, the main character, Willie Stark, evolves from an honest but dirt-poor citizen into a state governor. As he gains this high office, Long embraces everything he fought



against in his early life... or did he?

Maniates and Troutman run MCC's "Center for Experiential Learning" and do a fantastic job in the community. Roger Rapoport deserves applause as well for organizing this fine film forum.

What is STEM?

Earlier this issue, during the program report, there was a term, STEM, which created lots of consternation for readers, especially those who normally have a handle on things complex.

STEM is an acronym for Science, Technology, Engineering and Mathematics, and **Tom Keenan**, below, first introduced it to us when he proposed creating a STEM Committee to support efforts in our community. From the looks of it, the committee is taking off. Thursday, we received a demonstration and briefing from Mike Gerstweiler, director of the Muskegon Area Robotics Students (MARS) and his assistant, Jordan McClain, 5th grader at Mona Shores Ross Park, both below.

The committee's initial focus will be in support of efforts to strengthen STEM in the Elementary schools, Tom said, thru the use of Lego League robots teams. Seven teams are starting up now with possibly three more in the near future.
