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Last Week's Program

Michigan's Promise by Chris Burnaw

Last week, **John Severson**, right, shared good news about Muskegon Area Promise, which will support our students for a globally oriented, knowledge driven world.

Muskegon Area Promise addresses one of the biggest concerns in Muskegon - the lack of skilled talent for a growing jobs market, with 53% of current job postings requiring an Associate's degree, Certificate, or Bachelor's degree. By 2025, this number is projected to rise to 64%. Of Muskegon's workforce, only 31% have these types of post high school



degrees. The
Promise offers posthigh school
continuing education
scholarships for
MCC and Baker
College of

students with a 3.5
GPA who live in and
graduate from a
qualifying high

school located within MAISD boundaries. After many years of discussion and planning, Muskegon Area Promise is under way, launching in a two-phased approach. During the first phase, the Promise scholarship will be awarded to eligible students graduating from Muskegon Public, the Muskegon Heights Public School Academy System and Holton Schools in the 2014-15 and 2015-16 school years. During the second phase and beginning in 2016-17, the Promise scholarship will be awarded to eligible students graduating from high schools within all twelve local districts that comprise the Muskegon Area Intermediate School District, along with the area's nonpublic schools. Muskegon Area Promise is one of 10 Promise Zones in Michigan, but the first and only regional Zone (all others are cities).

To qualify for the Muskegon Area
Promise Scholarship students must: reside
within the boundaries of the Muskegon Area
Intermediate School District; graduate with a
3.5 GPA from a qualifying school located
within the boundaries of the MAISD; complete
and apply for the Free Application for Federal
Student Aid (FAFSA), making the Muskegon
Area Promise Scholarship a last dollar
scholarship (meaning it will cover whatever
other scholarships and funding will not).



There are several educational paths for Promise students: the 1st and 2nd year General Studies of a Bachelor's Degree Track; Associate's Degrees in Computer Programming, Graphic Design, Machining Technology, Nursing, Welding Technology, Culinary Arts; and Certificate Programs in Electronics Technology, Medical Records, Web Design, CAD Drafting & Design, Diesel Service Technology, and CNC Operator.

Once they are enrolled in Baker College or Muskegon Community College, students must maintain the Standards of Academic Progress toward their certificate or



associate's degree and comply with the Muskegon Promise Scholarship Student Success Guidelines, including placement tests prep sessions, student orientation, educational plan, check-in meetings, exam study sessions,

and early warning intervention. A Success Team mentors the students to keep them on track for graduation.

Muskegon Area Promise is governed by a Promise Zone Authority Board; the current Board members include Steve Parker (Chair), above, John Severson, Robert Jacobs, Gary Nelund, Cindy Larsen, Lee Coggin, Dale Nesbary, and Holly Hughes. Past members who were instrumental in early planning include Chris McGuigan, Dave Sipka, and Steve Olsen. The Promise Zone legislation defines that for the first two years, scholarships must be funded with private contributions; thereafter, a Promise Zone can capture half of the revenue growth from the regional state education tax, leading to a self-funding model

Muskegon Area Promise Zone is currently in the process of fundraising, with a goal of \$900,000. A GoFundMe account raised

\$23,647 from private donors and the College Access Networks. Then, at the Chamber's Business for Breakfast last week, four local companies stepped up to become Gold Level \$100,000 funders – Hines Corporation, ADAC Automotive, Nichols, and Alcoa Foundation for a total raised of \$423,647! As

a result of that announcement, other donors have come forward, bringing the total raised to \$763,647!! Thanks to all of these generous donors, we are on our way to realizing the success of the Promise - enhancing our school culture and programs to increase the number of students earning Promise scholarships, increasing educated, skilled, ready-to-work, local talent, growing existing business and attracting new business, and strengthening the image of Muskegon County. www.muskegonareapromise.org

After John's presentation, **Don Crandall** posed a challenge to Muskegon Rotary with the goal of engaging Rotary in supporting the Promise. Using the funds granted from the Community Grants Committee for this big "game changer" project, in addition to scholarship funds and *Grape Escape* fundraising, matching grants could be sought from Rotary International to raise significant funds to support this project. So what do you think, fellow Rotarians? Are we in? Supporting our youth in a big way will definitely bring great returns for the future of our community!
