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Rotary committee members support the work being done internally by keeping members informed, communicating with other committees, sharing resources, building capacity, and sharing knowledge. The external work being done by members is through promoting the Rotary brand, inviting new members, building a network of supporters, and reaching out to the community.



President Jane WAS the program this week with her great explanation of the "committee tune up" process she has shepherded during her Rotary year. The committee structure will be published in a future edition of RIM and members are encouraged to reach out to board members or committee leaders for more information. Thanks for your leadership, President Jane!

The responsibilities of the committees are to have a clear mission that is consistent with the Rotary International and Local Club goals, taking care of volunteers and members, scheduling regular meetings with an agenda, having clear communication within the club and with outside partners, and reporting to the Board.

The council chairperson is responsible for oversight of the committees under the umbrella of their council. In addition to providing support and guidance to these committees, the council chairperson should conduct a joint meeting of all the committee chairpersons in their council at least twice a year. If a committee chairperson resigns, creating a vacancy, the council chairperson is responsible for assisting the President-Elect in finding a new chair.

The term of office for a council chairperson is two years. The chairperson may elect to serve one additional two-year term.

The Muskegon Rotary Club members will see a quarterly increase in dues effective July 1, 2023 of \$166.00 and \$91.00 for ReWine.

From the quality of their character, their deep passion for Michigan and seeing Michigan grow and prosper, to the positive energy and real can-do attitude and the spirit and love of the work and opportunities created, she epitomizes the Rotary motto of service above self. Two of my favorite quotes of this candidate are:

"Education needs to be more than just reading and writing. We need to build young people and their character, build them as people, and as citizens." And,

Married for more than 40 years, the mother of two and new grandmother this week,

Carolyn Bloodworth is the Secretary/Treasurer of the Consumers Energy Foundation and the CMS Energy Foundation. She also serves as the corporation's Executive Director of Corporate Giving.
