# THIS WEEK'S PROGRAM: Life Leadership and Rotary Exchange Students

Doug Brown introduced our guests today; which included Life Leadership 2023 attendees and Rotary Exchange Students. Guests Peter Brown (Mona Shores High School) and Connor Smillie (Mona Shores Interact President) and Rebound exchange students Tyler Rop and Chloe Wilson, and Kyoka Tomoyama who is starting her exchange experience here with our club.

Doug shared that he and **Doug Wood** are taking over as liaisons for student engagement. We currently have clubs at North Muskegon, Muskegon, Reeths-Puffer, and Mona Shores, and hoping to get started at Oakridge.



Peter Brown addressed Rotary and shared his vision with our club. Peter hails from Washington Valley and is a retired Marine. He served a number of tours abroad, including Afghanistan, as a logistics officer. He is currently teaching English at Mona Shores High School. He is married to Clare and they have five children with number six on the way. Clare is a teacher in Grand Haven.

'Brief, brilliant and gone' is Peter's mantra so he kept his remarks brief and introduced Connor Smillie. Peter noted that he really wants to have an organized and efficient Interact club. Priority one is to have a sustainable and

productive club that includes a number of volunteer opportunities. Priority two is to be in alignment with Rotary and following rules, policies and guidelines. The third priority is to build a larger club, which will be a big focus of the fall trimester and providing high visibility volunteer opportunities within the school. They are ordering Interact tee shirts and wrist bands to increase visibility. As part of this initiative, they team wants to increase the diversity of the club and to be representative of the student body of Mona Shores High School. They want the club to look like Mona Shores High School.

Connor Smillie is the new Mona Shores Interact President, Connor will be sophomore this fall. He attended the Rotary mission trip to El Salvador over spring break. He also attend the Life Leadership Conference, at Ferris State University, where he was named conference attendee of the year. Connor thanked Rotary for the floor and recognized that Peter Brown was teacher of the year at Mona Shores High School and how excited the club is to have him as their advisor. Connor shared his vision to engage the Mona Shores student body, all of them; not just those looking to build their college resumes, but students that normally do not engage in extra-curricular activities. Connor wants to use Interact to assist others in growing and engaging in their community, inviting all students to participate in Interact.

Kristi Pawlak was invited to share more about Youth Exchange. Kristi introduced Tyler Rop and Chloe Wilson, our two Rebound students that studied abroad in 2022-2023.



Chloe introduced herself in Spanish, the native language of Chile. She is a rebound student having completed a year in Chile and has recently returned to the US. Chloe wanted to be an ambassador for the US and is now an ambassador for Chile. She desired to share culture and language and to make our world a smaller place.



Chloe was in Talca, Chile and woke up to the Andes Mountains each morning. Talca is approximately the same size as Grand Rapids and in the same time zone as Michigan. Chloe attended private (Montessori style) school in Chile. Chloe shared that there were approximately 60-90 students in her class, which felt very small compared to Reeths-Puffer High School. She also shared a number of photos from her journey. Chloe noted that she had a tremendous experience in Chile, with her two host families. She was able to participate in Rotary and Interact Club meetings and experiences. There were a number of exchange students present in Chile while Chloe was studying abroad.

Tyler Rop shared his experience in Estonia. Tyler introduced himself in the national language of Estonia, which is Estonian. Tyler spent the first month with his first host family, and had a total of three host families.



Before school started, he spent a lot of time touring the country and seeing all of the sites of Estonia. Tyler noted that his first family was beekeepers and he was able to assist them in the harvest. Tyler noted he fit in very well and only took about a week for him to get to know his entire class. Tyler said that they became friends very quickly. He was also able to participate in Rotary activities, as the club is much smaller, only about 15 members. Tyler completed 2-3 speeches a week as a Rotary exchange student. He was able to visit the arctic circle and met a reindeer.

He felt he knew half of Estonia by the end of his trip. Tyler will be a senior at North Muskegon High School this fall.

Kyoka Tomoyama hails from Tokyo, Japan. Kyoka is 15 years old and will be attending Reeths- Puffer High School. She has only been in the United States for 3-4 days and is just starting to settle in with her host family. Kristi noted that most exchange students have two to three host families to diversify their experiences in the United States, as well as when they study outside the United States. This allows the students to have multiple experiences while they are participating in study abroad experiences.

# Our Newest Paul Harris Fellow: Jon Covington

This Paul Harris recipient was born and raised in Muskegon and although has spent most their career outside of Muskegon and doesn't live here, he very much remains a part of this community.

He has spent his career in media: film – radio – television; largely in the LA area working for companies including Black Entertainment Television and also independently. He's worked in South Africa on projects with actors Terrence Howard and Jennifer Hudson. In his career, he has worked with or interviewed Chris Brown, Berry Gordy, Fantasia, Gladys Knight, Al Sharpton and many more. Jon knows or has a connection to everyone.

In LA he founded Men of Color in the Industry and Men of Color Read — which he brought back home to Muskegon and Kent Counties. He was the only African American radio station owner in Grand Rapids. Everything he does focuses on conversations and progress around the urban community. His social media is devoted to productive conversation on these issues. He is a mentor to many.



Jon is the recipient of the Charles H. Hackley Humanities Award and is a board member of The Boys and Girls Club of the Lakeshore.

And, of course, Jon is the producer, writer, director of *Black Man*.

Seven years ago, we invited Jon to the MMA to be part of a committee of 10 local African American men who would

organize an exhibition called, Sons: Seeing the Modern African American Male.

Being a media guy, we asked Jon to do a 10 minute loop of exhibition subjects talking about being a *Black Man* in Muskegon. Jon interviewed each participant and 10 minutes turned into 10 hours of extraordinarily film of Black men talking about their lives opening and candidly – no filters. Over the course of a year, Jon shaped this footage into what became *Black Man* – an extraordinary 90 minutes of film.

Only Jon Covington could have made this film. Only Jon could have pulled out of these men – many of whom very guarded individuals - what he did. Only Jon Covington could have convinced me that an art museum needed to coproduce a major full-length documentary film.

Jon has personally brought this film to Austin, LA (several times), Baltimore, Grand Rapids, Chicago, Atlanta, Washington DC and others. All to amazing receptions. It was really gaining steam on the film festival circuit up to March 2020. Since then, he's been back on the road with public and private screenings for industry professionals.

This film is completely universal in its content and impact. It tells stories that resonate everywhere.

And it does so with men from Muskegon. This film has put Muskegon on a national stage bringing new insight to the national conversation. Jon always said this film is about Anytown USA. But Anytown USA couldn't have done this because they don't have Jon Covington.
