ReWine meetings are every 1st & 3rd Thursday each month at 5:15pm at **Unruly Brewing** Tim is the president and CEO for ABVI. He noted that he does not often use power points so that he can accommodate persons with visual impairments. Their mission is to work to create an accessible environment for anyone with a visual impairment. ABVI serves 13 counties on the west side of the state since 1913. The founder of ABVI helped found the Braille alphabet with Helen Keller. ABVI was founded by Roberta Griffeth over 100 years ago. They are one of the oldest nonprofits in the state of Michigan. ABVI partners with Mary Free Bed for service provision. They are holding a groundbreaking with Mary Free Bed to build the first children's rehabilitation center in Michigan. ABVI also likes to partner with Mary Free Bed for wheelchair adaptive sports programs, including archery. Tim noted that the adaptive sports offered through Mary Free bed as they are already pushing adaptive sports for the disabled.

Tim noted that they work with persons with low vision. Vision can fluctuate day to day for some individuals with vision loss. They work to maximize remaining site for individuals and offer rehabilitation services. Nearly 70 million Americans have vision concerns and are anticipating that as the population ages that requests for services could double. Loss of vision affects all areas of life for person suffering from low vision or blindness. Common low vision conditions are macular degeneration, glaucoma, diabetic retinopathy and cataracts. There is a lot of mental health conversations surrounding change of life as vision deteriorates. A loss of independence may also affect individuals who are losing their site.

ABVI offers to support individuals with support groups, advocacy work, mobility and while cane training, employment initiatives, assistive technology, ride sharing and transportation services, as well as services animals and white canes. All ages are served via ABVI.


Muskegon offers a low vision clinic and assess, reassess and track vision loss. They develop treatment plans to assist individuals in navigating these life changes. Each treatment plan is very individualized, and each patient is assessed on their own medical and social needs. The rehabilitation team really works with persons to live independently, such as cooking and other daily living skills. There is also training on how to use adaptive technology and magnifiers. Technology continues to advance and become more portable. Cell phones and tablets have applications that can scan and read information for people with vision concerns. There are also orientation and mobility clinics that meet people where they are such as at home, shopping centers and employers.

ABVI also offers counseling services to support mental health, acceptance and grief over vision sight. These individual counseling sessions and supplement with peer support groups. ABVI does not want persons with vision loss to feel alone. ABVI also tries to support persons losing site to remain gainfully employed and to ensure that employers are accessible. ABVI is a nonprofit and for the support provided via the Senior Millages that are passed in our county, state agencies, federal grants and fund raising activities and private payment.
