Paul Harris Award Brad Seymour



Michael B. Seymour, known to most of us as Brad, was drawn to aviation at an early age, influenced by his two grandfathers – one -a pilot in the Civil Air Patrol and the other - one of the few *enlisted* pilots in the military. But Brad was discouraged from pursuing a career in flying, so he enrolled and graduated from the University of Illinois with a degree in finance.

He got a job in his field, but the dream of flying was still in his heart, so he took lessons and earned a private pilot's license. Hoping to become an airline pilot, Brad joined the Air Force where he worked on B-1B supersonic bombers while stationed in Texas at Dyess Air Force base. Subsequently he became a flight engineer assigned to the military's biggest transport plane, the C-5. Brad and his crew delivered cargo and passengers all over the world. The flights could also be sobering. Sometimes their precious cargo was deceased soldiers.

Brad remained in the Air Force until 2001, when he transitioned to the Reserves. However, two weeks later, on September 11, he was called up for active duty. He was assigned to a crew moving supplies and people across both the Atlantic and the Pacific and into places like Afghanistan.

Brad was on active duty for most of the next 10 years but also worked as a civilian. Interestingly, he took time to attend Grand Rapids Community College and earn a nursing degree subsequently working at Hackley Hospital and the Poppen Hospice residence.

Still attached to the National Guard and seeking a promotion Brad shifted into the only full time spot open to him at the time -- Air Battle Manager -- and he deployed for a second time to Ramstein, Germany to work for the commander of forces in Europe and Africa, as part of an around-the-clock reporting team.

In 2020, Brad began his final four years in the Air Force, all of which would be spent in Ramstein, largely apart from family, including Ammy, his wife of only three years, and her two children. To make it work for them, they both crossed the Atlantic multiple times so they could be together at holidays, celebrations, and family milestones.

On his retirement as a Senior Master Sergeant this June, the Air Force recognized Brad for his service that included

- Distinguishing himself as a Chief of Combat Operations Technician Manager with the 603d Air Operations Center that managed the daily execution of operations in two combatant commands covering more than 32 million square miles.
- Leading a team that provided 24-hour command and control of the execution of 130 daily defensive attacks, including the combined NATO response to the Russian invasion of Ukraine.
- Coordinating three Bomber Task Force deployments, providing assurance and security to our allies in Europe, Africa, and the Middle East.
- Participating in a hostage recovery providing oversight of intelligence, surveillance, and close air support assets, resulting in the individual's rescue with no friendly fire casualties.

In all his years of military service, Brad is most proud of his participation in humanitarian relief. For example, when an earthquake devastated parts of Istanbul, he was in the crew that transported an urban search and rescue team from Miami to Istanbul. And when Afghanistan refugees were coming into Germany, he provided nursing triage helping families to get settled.

Brad's thirty years in the military were unexpected and exciting, and characterized by strong leadership, his enthusiasm for his work, a love of challenge and adventure, and a deep commitment to service above self. Now settled back in Montague, Brad is looking forward to resuming his nursing career and spending time with his family and friends.

He recently volunteered as a nurse at the Harbor Hospice's Camp Courage for bereaved children. And he is eager to participate in Harbor's We Honor Veterans program, to recognize the service of hospice patients who are veterans. He continues to look for opportunities to give back.

Congratulations Brad. Well done.

The family services department provides accessible, effective, and diversified social services programs that enhance and maximize individual tribal citizens' capabilities for greater self-sufficiency and wellbeing. The focus to maintain the preservation and reunification of Indian families by providing direct services for Indian children and families in compliance with the Indian Child Welfare Act and Michigan Indian Family Preservation Act.



Services and Programs Provided.

The Self -Sufficiency Program: This is a holistic program that builds on the strength of individuals to create independence and accomplish future goals. Through case management and system navigation, individuals will be able to access Tribal and non-Tribal programs that assist with the journey to self-sufficiency.

Indian Child Welfare Intervention & Reunification Program: Intervention in State court proceedings as per the Indian Child Welfare Act (ICWA) and the Michigan Indian Family Preservation Act (MIFPA). Foster Care monitoring, adoption and Case Management services. Service Plan development to accomplish specific goals. The department works in conjunction with the Binojeeuk Commission (Child Welfare Commission) who make independent recommendations on a case-by-case basis. The department also provides Qualified Expert Witness (QEW)

testimony as required by ICWA and MIFPA.

Elder Support Services: These services aid with Tribal and non-Tribal programs including case management services, advocacy, and referrals. Utilizing the Elder's Circle of Care these services give individual's the ability to live in their own home or community safely, independently, and comfortably regardless of age, income, or ability level for as long as possible. Family Services also collaborates with Adult Protective Services (APS) to protect Elders in abusive situations. They also assist Elders with questions and concerns when accessing programs on Federal and State levels.

Member Assistance: This offers assistance and support to tribal members using a collaborative multidepartmental approach. The program provides short-term relief to those experiencing heating and energy, food, housing, utility and transportation crisis. Elder citizens who are disabled and are limited in their ability to perform routine household chores can access "Elder Chore Services." An Elder meal program is available at no charge to all tribal elders, spouses and disabled individuals. These meals are served Monday through Thursday at the Aki Community Center located on LRBOI reservation.

Family and Individual Counseling:

Counseling assistance to individuals and families directed at basic problem solving, intra-family relationships, and child parenting issues.

Education and Assistance: Facilitate with the basic knowledge of budgeting through tracking, analyzing, identifying and setting goals.

Positive Indian Parenting: is designed to provide a brief, practical, and culturally specific training program for Indian parents. The program is to help Indian parents explore the values and attitudes expressed in traditional Indian childrearing practices and then to apply those values to modern parenting skills.

Family Spirit Program: This is a holistic approach with appropriate home base family involvement. This approach is designed to be flexible and interactive as parents gain knowledge and skills to promote healthy development and positive lifestyles for themselves and their children. The focus empowers parent(s) and support young Native parents from pregnancy to 3 years of age.

Victim Services: The service provides support and education services to survivors of domestic violence, sexual assault, dating violence, and stalking. Specific services may include cultural advocacy, emergency shelter and outreach services.


