District Governor Visit

Speaker: Paul Heroman, Rotary District 6290 Governor

We gave a warm Muskegon Rotary welcome to our District Governor, **Paul Heroman**, and his wife, Barbara.

The annual visit by our current "DG," who represents more than 2,400 members in our RI District 6290, is always a great time to both reflect on the global reach of Rotary and what we can do to improve our own clubs and communities.

DG Paul has had a busy schedule, with our Club being the fourth he's visited this week and 22nd to date of the 55 clubs he'll be visiting during his year term as the District Governor.

Heroman met with our Club's Board of Directors before lunch and acknowledged the good work we're doing. "You have an awful lot going on...and you want to tell stories about that," he said, calling out **John Noling** (in particular) and our Life Leadership Conference work among our ongoing projects.

He said a recent *Wall Street*Journal obituary on best-selling author
David McCullough included a quote from
him that history comes to life when it's
presented by "telling a story."



The same can be said for Rotary and Rotarians, he said. "You want to tell stories of all that you're doing...Rotarians do good stuff in the world...we make people's lives better."

Heroman, a member of the nearby Ada-Cascade Club outside of Grand Rapids, outlined four priorities he has for this Rotary year:

- Increase our impact of what we do locally and globally;
- Expand our reach, including areas where clubs have not been active before;
- Enhance participant engagement; "Rotarians are not just going for lunch even when you have good cookies, acknowledging the Lake House's tasty treats;
- Increase our ability to adapt; this
 is especially important as we
 emerge from the challenges of
 operating during COVID's most
 challenging times in 2020 and
 2021. We have survived these
 times and we need to keep
 adapting and changing to meet
 future challenges.

Among the stories Heroman shared with us was his visit on June 25, 2022 to Grand Haven where the District held an End Polio Now fundraiser (where some decided to jump out of a plane for the cause). He politely declined to jump but among the people he and Barb spoke with was 100-year-old Rotarian Dick Grout, whose World War II service included Normandy (where his unit had 80 percent casualties) and the Battle of the Bulge. So, jumping out of a plane at 100 is, apparently, not a big deal!



Another participant was a non-Rotarian, Kate, who while in a wheelchair, was determined to jump, saying she liked what Rotary stood for. "I wanted to be with people with like-minded values." Give that woman a parachute!

The plane-jumping event raised \$63,000 and with the Gates Foundation 2:1 match, the total tops \$190,000.

The District also focuses on Leadership, Membership and the Rotary International Foundation. Within the Foundation, there is a new initiative we'll hear more about: HANWASH, the Haiti National Clean Water, Sanitation and Hygiene Strategy. More information is forthcoming as this is an effort that expands beyond our District; however, Heroman knows with all the clean water work our Club and others have done, there is local expertise to draw upon.



Heroman also showed a couple of videos from our RI International President Jennifer Jones. In addition to being RI's first female president, (this reporter says...about time!) she is also from Michigan! And in a couple of years, the second woman RI president will come from Pennsylvania, which is part of our RI Zone (which is Rotary parlance for a collection of districts). RI President Jennifer stressed the importance of this year's theme of "Imagine Rotary" by simply stating, you cannot imagine yesterday but you can imagine tomorrow.



In another video, Jones pointed out there are 525,600 minutes in one year...the length of her term. As he wrapped up, DG Paul told **President Jane** they **o**nly have 445,000 minutes left!

At the 2022 Life Leadership Conference, I made many new friends, memories, and gained an immense amount of knowledge about leadership and myself. I feel that the more engaging a speech is, the longer it will stay with you. That is why I will always remember the speeches from LLC.
