THIS WEEK'S PROGRAM: Muskegon Polish Fest

Labor Day Weekend September 3 & 4, 2021 at Hackley Park

Tom Sanocki is the Polish Festival President and was our distinguished guest at Rotary today. He was joined by Len Piasecki, Joanne Southland, and Barb Werner, board members for the Polish Festival, and assisted with today's presentation. Tom shared his Polish background and his family's

immigration from southern Poland for employment opportunities.



Music plays a rich history in the Sanoki family and many members play the violin. Tom also hosts NewsTalk1090 on Saturday and Sunday mornings, featuring polka melodies.

Tom shared the history of the Seaway Polka Fest in the early 1980's and 1990's which was a predecessor of the current Polish Festival. When the Seaway Polka Fest ended, there was a desire to bring the Polish culture and heritage back to the forefront in Muskegon County. The board of directors was established to produce a Polish Heritage Festival and to ensure fun and food were brought back to Muskegon neighborhoods and to enhance the wellbeing of neighborhoods.

In 2016 the board was formed and the first festival was held in Muskegon. 7,000 people attended the first Polish Festival. It is anticipated that 15,000 people will attend the Polish Festival this year. So head down to Hackley Park and get in line for sausage, sauerkraut, pierogis and Paczki (pronounced pownch-key)-famous Polish doughnuts often consumed on Fat Tuesday.



There will be both Polish and domestic beers on tap. Polish immigrants have produced the Polish beer and will be brought from the Detroit area to Muskegon. The 313 Beer is described as a lager slightly heavier than a Miller Lite. Alliance Beverage will offer a variety of alcoholic and non-alcoholic beverages.

The Polish Festival is very family friendly. All kids get in for free at the Polish Festival and the festival will offer face painting and balloon sculptures. There is a free zone for children.



One of the biggest draws is the homemade wooden dance floor for polka dancing. Polka dancing offers beautiful, costumed dancers on the 1,100 square foot dance floor.



Free polka dancing lessons are offered on both Friday and Saturday from 4:30 to 5:00PM. The floor is one of a kind and installed by the Muskegon Big Red Football team as it is extremely heavy.

Polish Festival bands include: Polski Chix Polka Band, Rick Vinecki and Polka Friends, Stan Mroz Polka Band, Trent Urbutes and the Polka Riot Band, and Virgil Baker and Just for Fun. \$5 for 21 and older and under 21 admission is free. Many of the bands are local and there is one "riotous" band travelling here from Saginaw. In between the Polka bands, there are non-food venders available: such as Polish pottery, apparel, etched glass, jewelry and Polish artifacts.



August 5, 2021

Committee Reports:

John Noling gave an update on Interact clubs: Mona Shores had a great start with their Interact board meeting, Reeths-Puffer plans to meet next week. Orchard View met last week and Muskegon Catholic Central wants to start an Interact Club. We had discussions about the fact that we still want to find advisors at Muskegon and Muskegon Heights to help start their clubs again. Kathy Betts also reminded us that we had talked about a possible Interact Club through the Boys & Girls Club.

The Chili Cook Off Committee, Katie Drake and Annette Smedley, were not in attendance but Esther Ricco mentioned that we should be thinking about where the CCO money will go this year since there are no trips planned due to the pandemic. Discussion indicated a preference that the money still go to water filters in Honduras and homes in El Salvador, since those needs still exist, even if we can't travel to help install/build them. This would satisfy each Interact club's requirement for an international service project.

Other Business:

Esther Ricco contacted **Merica Dobry** and she is on board with ordering our ReWine shirts along with the Rotary shirt order that she is planning.

Kathy Betts said she would send us some links to look at Rotary table tents and banners that we could order so we can display them at our table whenever we meet.

We are beginning planning for two ReWine service projects so far:

1. A pool/pizza party for Interactors at the Boys & Girls Club. This would help Interact students from all the schools get to know each other and rental of the pool would benefit the BGC. **Kathy Betts** is going to get us a price for the rental and some possible dates in October that we can propose to the Interact clubs.

2. United Way Day of Caring (September 10)P: We are looking into teaming up ReWine/Rotarians with Interact Clubs and are hoping to include women veterans from WINC for All Women Veterans of Muskegon. Michelle Burley will get in touch with Dominique Bunker of United Way to see if she can arrange a service project to benefit a local woman veteran. Esther Ricco will then get in touch with Loraine Rodriguez from WINC and invite local women veterans to join us. Esther, Ken, and Michelle briefly discussed this idea with Zaneta Adams (2021 winner of the Lakeshore Innovator of the Year) and Loraine Rodriguez at the Lakeshore Innovator of the Year Award Event.
