## This week's program: Pound Buddies: Putting People and Pets Together

The program and speakers were introduced by Cathy Brubaker-Clarke, a long-time Pound Buddies board member, advocate, and shelter voluntee. Brubaker-Clarke stated that the non-profit 501(c)(3) rescue and adoption agency opened a new shelter location at 3279 East Laketon in 2021. Connie Karry was in the audience and recognized as one of the founding members of Volunteers for Muskegon County Animal Control now known as Pound Buddies. And Doug Brown was acknowledged as a fellow Pound Buddies board member. Jan Jacobs was introduced as the current board president, previous campaign director for the new building, and active volunteer at the shelter. Lana Carson was introduced as the dedicated, long-term Executive Director who oversees shelter operations and relentlessly advocates for neglected animals and the best possible environment for their care, shelter, and adoption.

2023 Shelter Statistics
1,657 Dogs were taken into Pound Buddies.
668 Dogs were reunited with their owners.
497 Dogs were adopted into new homes.
96 Dogs were transferred to

other rescue organizations.

Jan Jacobs informed us that Pound Buddies is experiencing the same challenges as other agencies (postpandemic): limited resources, stretched workers, and increased costs. In addition, the number of abused and abandoned animals have substantially increased. Jacobs stated "This is our new normal. Everything that is happening in the community is also happening at the shelter." And she shared some staggering shelter statistics: "Pound Buddies has taken in more than 1,500 dogs over the past few years, compared to less than 1,000 in previous years." People are struggling financially and emotionally, which negatively impacts their ability to properly care for their pets. Jacobs explained that Pound Buddies rely heavily on grants and donations to fund their rescue, shelter, medical, care, and adoption services. And about 25% of their overall revenue comes from the County of Muskegon to provide the added services of Animal Care and Control as required by the State.

Lana Carson shared that all dogs – regardless of breed, age, health, or disposition are accepted at Pound Buddies. And the agency provides medical treatment, behavioral training, and socialization to many of the dogs in preparation for adoption. Carson exclaimed that Pound Buddies is committed to <u>not</u> euthanizing healthy, adoptable dogs. They have reunited lost pets with owners, adopted dogs to new homes, and released animals to other shelters or rescues to maintain an approximate 85% live release rate.

In addition to responding to stray, biting, abandoned and/or abused dogs – Pound Buddies is often called along with police and fire to deal with dangerous dogs, fighting dogs, and dogs viciously protecting owners who are being arrested. Carson and staff proactively reached out to local health and human service agencies to learn more about resources for our most vulnerable residents so that they can make referrals when appropriate. The services and activities of Pound Buddies stretch to every crevice of the community. And the related demands/needs have reached a historical high!



How can you help? Donate, adopt, and volunteer. They urgently need items like dog food, milk bones, paper towels, Dawn soap, and cleaning supplies; but monetary donations help the most.

# Muskegon-Grand Rapids Rotary Collaboration and Service Project

When: Saturday Aug. 17, 2024. Service project from 9 a.m.-11:30 a.m. and then the social gathering from Noon - 1:30 p.m.

Social project: Providing exterior grounds and waterfront cleanup and improvements to the Boys and Girls Club of the Muskegon Lakeshore, 900 W. Western. The effort will be supported with equipment from the City of Muskegon's volunteer trailer. Brief tours of the Clubhouse and the community fitness center should be available.

Social engagement: Rotarians will gather for fellowship at The Deck, a wildly popular beach bar at the city's Pere Marquette Beach.
