Interact groups are required to conduct two service projects per year: one that benefits their local community or school and the other builds on service worldwide and understanding.



De'Antae noted that they have not yet completed their service projects but are working on them. Youth Action Committee provided them with a \$500 grant. Two students from Muskegon High

School will attend a service trip to El Salvador, including De'Antae. Megan noted that they were able to bring Molly Kennedy to the Reeths-Puffer High School and their club was able to spend time with her. There were three sessions; one for lower classmen, upper classmen, and the Reeths-Puffer Interact Club. At Orchard View, Carina noted they have done community service for a local veteran (raking leaves) and fall clean up. They raised funds and have purchased a wheelchair for a person affected by polio. Carina's Interact club is doing Adopt-a-Family and are purchasing gifts for a family of six. They will purchase and wrap the gifts for the students. They also plan to do a fundraiser for winter clothing for students in need. Megan noted that they are shopping for a foster youth through Bethany Christian Services and are purchasing Christmas gifts for a two-year-old that just entered foster child.

Megan reported they are also sending three students to El Salvador and are fundraising for these students. De'Antae noted that they are

working to have the diatribe at Muskegon, organizing a blood drive and fund raising for the El Salvador trip. De'Antae noted that they are always searching for new students to participate. Megan noted that bringing Molly Kennedy to the school has really high-lighted the Interact group. Carina also noted that their Interact group is seeing a positive impact on their

school. All three students noted that Interact provides them an opportunity to share about themselves and what they are passionate about, which helps develop their



leadership skills. They have been able to use their voice, speak up, and are more comfortable sharing ideas, wisdom, and gifts. De'Antae also noted that he has really grown and Interact helps him to focus on others versus himself. He is very passionate about fund raising for any of the activities his Interact group is passionate about. Megan noted that she too is passionate about fundraising for Interact student ideas and that their small initiatives are making a big impact on their school and community. Carina noted that it has helped her to connect to others in her school and feels like she has been able to have an impact on other's lives. Megan noted that Interact helps her feel connected to others, new groups of people, and be more confident in what worries her and ideas. De'Antae feels that he is working to help others and be pushed outside of his comfort zone.



Our future Rotarians commented that service above self means that De'Antae can be counted on to be there and to help others. Megan noted that it really helps her to look



at how she can help others and that means making sacrifices in her own life. Carina noted that she really enjoys supporting others as it helps her to learn more about herself and helps her handle her own anxieties. Carina noted that she would love to engage more with Muskegon Rotary and to be seen as capable of helping others. Megan also noted that Muskegon Rotary supports them with fund raising, pop cans fund a ton of work that they are doing at their school and the community. De'Antae also noted that funding really opens doors for them to do more in the community and enjoys the impact that they are having on him.



All three students noted the biggest challenges, after the pandemic, is growing membership, as well as keeping members active and involved. All three noted that many or their new members are lower classmen and they are busy helping them grow their abilities. Carina noted she created a binder of information on how to run meetings, what they have done, what has been successful and membership information. Carina noted that they would love to do a Haunted Trail or Turkey Trot but have not been able to get that off the ground. Megan would love to do a dress or suit drive for students to participate in formal dances. De'Antae noted that they really want to get the blood drive off the ground.
