This week's program: READ Muskegon

We received a great overview of Read Muskegon from one of our own, Executive Director Melissa Moore, including its history since its

2005 founding, the programs it provides today and a glimpse at its future plans.


Read Muskegon is the only nonprofit in Muskegon solely dedicated to literacy, said Moore, who became the organization's first full-time executive director in 2013. "A lot of people know who Read Muskegon is, but I think many people don't know the depth of the programs we provide."



Moore said a lot of focus is on third grade reading levels, but a

statistic she focuses on is the 6th grade reading level. Achieving this level is important for things like applying for jobs, renting or buying homes and performing banking services. Unfortunately, about half half of Americans (54 percent) read below a 6th grade level. Read Muskegon is helping tackle this challenge by offering programs with a variety of community partners, but also promoting change in systems across our society, Moore said. Read Muskegon's programs include:

Adult basic education
English Language Learners
Re-entry to society from prison
or jails
K-12 tutoring
Early childhood -- 2 generation
learning



It is working on "systems change" through a variety of efforts, including:

Public awareness
A language access plan
Advocacy
Literacy ally training
Promoting a national action
plan for adult literacy

"The adult literacy rate hasn't changed in 30 years," Moore said. More than 25,000 adults ages 16-74 in Muskegon County read below a 4th grade level, which is considered functionally illiterate. And she said outreach is so important as only about 10 percent of adults needing literacy and education programs receive them.

The benefits of participating in literacy programs are numerous, but the work takes time as many who walk through their doors have given up on being able to read. The organization's focus is: Learn, Transform and Thrive. "It takes time and it's often in baby steps but eventually they begin to thrive," she said.



In 2023, Read Muskegon had 457 program participants and 85 percent program growth in recent years. Some of the fastest growing programs are English as a second language (270 percent raise) and jail-based programs (a 288 percent increase). Because of this success, Read Muskegon is outgrowing its facility at 26 E. Broadway Avenue in downtown Muskegon Heights.

She said the city's Downtown Development Authority has been a great landlord and they're looking to stay in city. Read Muskegon has purchased the former Potters Lamps building, 2709 Peck Street.

Moore said more details will be announced soon, but the larger space still provides a great downtown Muskegon Heights location which is close to local schools, churches and other community partners. Among the new building's benefits will be room to provide childcare for program participants, a significant challenge for many people looking to use their services. It will also give Read Muskegon a chance to promote literacy among a vulnerable community while their family members also participate in adult programs.

With the new location they expect to serve more than 600 people annually, Moore said. "We've come a long way since our founding in 2005."

Brave Rotarians Contest!



Meredith Smillie announced this week's exciting Brave Rotarians' contestants who were cast off the wheel and out of the contest: Jules Terry, Don Hutchins, Emma Peterson, and Joanie Smith. (Contributed by Roger Morgenstern) As we've watched the "Wheel of Misfortune" spinning during the last couple of weekly meetings, some Rotarians, especially our younger members, have been asking RIM staff, what's this Brave Rotarian thing all about? Here's the facts, checked by our coordinator for Paul Harris Fellows, Meredith Smillie.

The Brave Rotarian contest is one of several types of promotions we have during the year to get Rotarians to contribute to The Rotary International Foundation. The Foundation does great work around the world with voluntary financial support from local Rotarians like our Muskegon members. It is suggested by Rotary International (RI) that each Rotarian contribute at least \$100 a year toward the RI Foundation. A Brave Rotarian contest is a fun way to do this. For the contest underway now, Meredith put out the ask for volunteers who each contribute \$100. Their names are put on the "Wheel of Misfortune" and each week 3 Rotarians are eliminated. They are thanked for their \$100 contribution. At the end of the contest in a couple of weeks, two Rotarians will be "left

on the wheel." Those Rotarians will have a Paul Harris Fellow (PHF) granted to them in their name. A PHF is Rotary International's way of recognizing Rotarians who donate \$1,000 to the RI Foundation. These fellows can be obtained by Rotarians who donate \$1,000 over a period of time, or they can be given or granted to others on behalf of Rotarians or a Club. In our Muskegon Club, \$3 of your quarterly dues goes toward "purchasing" Paul Harris Fellows which the Club then gives to outstanding community members during the year.

Muskegon Rotary Club Survey Results



Melissa Horton, a member of the membership committee, provided an overview of the recent survey.

Click this link (members only) to see the results. "The survey response was 42%, an amazing response rate," she said. "You did it, thank you and we heard your voice."

A few figures: Over 90 percent of those surveyed overall were "satisfied" or "somewhat satisfied" to be a member of the club. There were also high marks for how the weekly meetings are run, the number of service projects and that the club is a welcoming organization.

The survey showed the three top community needs that should be addressed through service projects include homelessness/housing, literacy (great timing considering this week's presentation!) and youth mentoring.

Horton thanked membership committee chair Mary Anne Gorman for all her work on the survey. The committee is taking the results and sharing with club committees to address areas of concern and interest of members to make our club even stronger.
