Today the Arts & Culture Coalition of Muskegon includes the Arts Council of White Lake, USS Silversides Submarine Museum, Blue Lake Fine Arts Camp, the Frauenthal Center, Hackley Public Library, the James Jackson Museum of African American History, the Lakeshore Art Festival, The Lakeshore Museum Center, Muskegon Area District Library, Muskegon Civic Theatre, Muskegon Community College, Muskegon Museum of Art, the Playhouse at White Lake, and the West Michigan Symphony.
