THIS WEEK'S PROGRAM: Lorin Industries

Lorin Industries is a great example of a successful home-grown business. Founded in 1943 by Herb Kersman, who came to Muskegon from Ohio, it is now run by his grandson Park, who purchased the business from his father Robert "Buzz" Kersman in

ROTARY CLUB MUSKEGON MICHIGAN 2006. Buzz worked at Lorin for 40 years and Park joined the family business in 1997, becoming president in 2011.


"After working in the timber and automotive

industries it was like coming back home," Kersman said of his return to Lorin in the late 1990s. "Growing up in the business, I understood it and it was very exciting for me to be involved as I progressed through the organization."



Lorin is both unique in being a thirdgeneration family business as well as the product it creates, anodized aluminum. Now, this RIM correspondent didn't excel in science, so we'll keep it simple... Anodizing is a chemical reaction when an oxide is "grown on the aluminum," oxidizing in a controlled manner. The process stops the oxidation, or deterioration, of the aluminum. Additional processes add a variety of colors and finishes. The finished product is then used in a variety of materials, especially in the building and architectural industries.

CONTINUOUS COIL ANODIZING LINE



Park showed some amazing examples of where Lorin's products have ended up across the world, including the outer "skin" of the renovated Superdome in New Orleans to the American Olympic and Paralympic Museum in Colorado. Closer to home, you can check out the metal roof at the North Muskegon Community United Methodist Church for an example of their work.



"It's not just a science but it's also an art," Kersman said of the unique fivepart process. Lorin buys its rolled aluminum in bulk and then sells the finished product for a wide variety of uses.



"We have created a culture of innovation with an increased focus on the architectural industry," Kersman said. Some of the end products using anodized aluminum include ceiling systems, lighting fixtures, doors and door hardware, lobby wall panel systems, directional signage, and decorative trim. All of Lorin's manufacturing is done at its Roberts Street location in the city of Muskegon, where it's been located since the 1960s. It has sales offices across the U.S. and China, a number of authorized sales representatives across the world.



At Lorin, our Vision is to provide inspirational and innovative solutions to the global marketplace.

Examples of their work can also be seen in the transportation, commercial appliances and various specialty markets.

Like the Kersman family, Lorin has had many long-term employees, some of them working there for 40 years. Park said it's been a time of transition with older employees retiring and having to hire new people, but the workforce remains strong, he said.

"It's the people who make the business, not the machines," Kersman said. "As we've transitioned, we've built from within because it's such a unique business."
