



Rotary International District Raffle Tickets





Rotary International Foundation - **Don Crandall**, activities started in 1996 when Muskegon Rotary joined with the Rotary Clubs from Grand Haven, Spring Lake, and Holland to create a 501c3 organization to do international projects. Three things you can do to get involved; serve on the committee, sign up for a trip to Honduras it will change your life and you will get a sense of what world community service is all about, and attend a Rotary International Meeting. Rotary Action Committees have everything from Physicians, Nurse's Motorcyclists, Yachtsmen, Water/Sanitation, and World Peace. If you go to the Rotary International Website and review

the committees, you can start connecting with people and get involved in international involvement.



Community Service Projects - **Mark Meyers**, the Grants Committee reviews grant's each year. Rotary has three major fundraisers; Grape Escape, Seaway Run, and Parties in the Park. This year the committee received three requests. The first grant provided \$5,000.00 towards the Hubert Massey Mural, it's a 65 by 12-foot mural that will be placed on Mercy Health Arena. The second grant provided \$5,000.00 to the Beechwood Bluffton Neighborhood Association to develop a fitness trail in the Beechwood Park and surrounding the public areas. The third grant provided \$2500.00 to the Lakeshore Art Festival. The funds are used towards materials and art supplies for families to create art during the festival free of charge. The grants committee has some additional funds yet this year and are willing to entertain a mid-year grant request. Every Rotarian Every Year - **Ginny Sprague**, as you spend time in Rotary, you hear about different outreach initiatives like End Polio Now and Every Rotarian Every Year that supports the work of the Rotary Foundation Worldwide. 

The Muskegon Rotary Club supported project one "Moxie" and project two "What Defines Muskegon" the mural that will go on the exterior wall of the second story arena. In the mural you will see Native Americans, lumbering, industrial, cultural infrastructure that makes up our town, and it will lead up to where we are today with a beautiful

sunset view on the far side of the mural of Lake Michigan.



Membership Engagement - **Mary Anne Gorman**, is asking people to embrace the motto that Rotary International put out "each one bring one and invite a prospective member to attend a weekly lunch meeting" We have a variety of volunteer activities and fundraisers that go throughout the year. This is an opportunity to introduce a prospective member into the work that Rotary does. Rotary has an orientation program the first Wednesday of each month at 8:00am, and an Engagement and Retention Subcommittee that is currently recruiting more people to join.



Diversity, Equity, and Inclusion - **Jeff Lewis**, reaching a target audience in the community can sometimes be difficult. Rotary and DEI is a perfect conduit to get law enforcement and our community to provide outreach. The term outreach is where we provide a service or an activity to a group that doesn't have access. It's

important to not be stationary, but be mobile, and take the service/activity to the target group and that's what DEI and Jeff did. Law Enforcement and Brianna Scott brought the community together and that was the birth of impact which is "Enhancing Police And Community Trust" Rotary is great with being mobile, providing outreach services, solving potential problems through communication, and has a deep understanding of community needs. 
Digital Photo Archives



The Importance of Black History

Black History Month was created by Carter G. Woodson in 1926. He believed that if a race had no recorded history, it would lose its traditions and risk having its accomplishments and culture erased. The month of February was chosen to honor the birth month of both Frederick Douglas and Abraham Lincoln. Many of this nation’s accomplishments were made possible due to the contributions of Black people. Black History Month was recognized federally in 1976.

Growing up on the West Coast and attending a traditional public school, I remember very little mentioned in my U.S. history lessons about people who looked like me. I do recall hearing about Crispus Attucks being the first man killed in the American Revolution. The 1960s Civil Rights movement, which occupied a small section in my textbook, mentioned Malcolm X and Martin Luther King, Jr. as two key figures in the movement. Very little was spoken or written about slavery and its impact on this country.

As an undergraduate at Kentucky State University, a historically black college (HBCU), I came to realize from my education and experience how little I knew about my own history. I began to feel a subconscious pressure around the fact the very little about the contributions of people that looked like me was being shared in public school education. I did not have heroes with whom I could identify or to whose achievements I could aspire.

What further personified this revelation for me was the release of the 1997 movie “Amistad,” which was based on a true and significant moment during America’s slave trade. The thought came to me how I was not familiar with this historical event, so I began researching and discovering other incidents in black history unfamiliar to me but instrumental in shaping our history.

For these revelations, I am so thankful for my HBCU experience, but so much more needs to be done in recognizing and acknowledging the history of blacks for everyone living in this country. First, and foremost for people of color, I pose the question, “If we have no idea of what influence our people have on this country, what does this do to us subconsciously?”

Secondly, we all need heroes, not just the descendants of slaves, but everyone. We, as a people, should know how our contributions have shaped this country. As a father of three daughters, I want to be confident that equity in education and school curriculums reflects all students.

I would like to see this country evolve to celebrating and recognizing all the contributions that black Americans have made in the U.S. – not just during Black History Month – but throughout the entire year.

Let this year be the year you are intentional about increasing your awareness of Black History. Share this blog with others, listen to a podcast, join a book club, attend a webinar, attend an event, etc. It is never too late to get started.
