the Lakeshore (C.A.L.L.); but it's also a play on words because we want residents in the service area to call (the verb) 2-1-1 to "increase access to community services through effective and compassionate information and assistance" (the mission). CALL 211 is a 501©3 nonprofit organization that strives to be a visible and effective access for those in need of health and human service programs while promoting consumer education and option choices. They can easily connect individuals to information and agency referrals for everyday needs or crisis situations.

Sarah Johnson, Resource Manager, continued the program by presenting the four



main components of CALL 211's services: 1) Regional Contact Center, 2) Community Resource Directory, 3) Data & Reporting, and 4) Community Engagement. There are a variety of ways to connect with 211 – by phone, chat, text, email, or website. To do the work, CALL 211 utilizes specialized software designed to maintain information and referral data; and to communicate with other platforms of agency partners. In addition, the

database can gather volumes of statistical data to capture and report on a variety metrics. The services provided are objective, multi-lingual, available 24/7, and always confidential.



Presented by MUSKEGON CIVIC THEATER





RI: WHERE IT ALL BEGAN

Rotary is celebrating its 119-year anniversary this year with countless stories of service and goodwill in its history. Here's a small tale of its beginning:

The first Rotary meeting was held in Room 711 of the Unity Building on Dearborn Street in downtown Chicago. The room, the office of mining engineer Gus Loehr, was restored to its original condition for RI's 75th anniversary in 1980. When the building was demolished in 1989, Rotarian members of the Paul Harris 711 Club removed and preserved the room's flooring, wood trim, office equipment, and furnishings. In 1994, the room was re-created at RI World

VOGAS: SIGNIFICANT IMPACT Contributed by Bill Johanson




When AV guru Mike Vogas, right, joined Rotary a couple of years ago, one of his early comments

concerned the poor quality of the hotel meeting's audio system. We'd heard that complaint before – except, that is, from those veteran members pleasantly dozing after lunch - but newbie member Mike rose to action with better equipment and his personal quality sound during the meeting.

We may not have fully realized Mike's total value at first, fools that we were. Then, the Covid epidemic struck, changing the world as well as Club meetings. Several members quit or went on leave, and Muskegon Rotary membership was in jeopardy of whoknows-what. Fortunately, the Vogas Studio introduced us to Zoom video and, before long, meetings continued off-site and in surprisingly effective fashion. Some 240 members soon dwindled down to 223 - not too bad but dedication to service remained strong as did member recruitment, student involvement, and ReWine Satellite support.

We delight in all this. RI has continued strengthening Rotary membership around the world and certainly here. Muskegon members are again meeting in person as well as via Zoom. The important business of Rotary – Service Above Self – continues.





Our reflection for the week was given by **Karen Buie** who recited "Words to Live By" which included, "No matter how you feel, get up, dress up, and show up; life isn't tied with a bow but it's still a gift."
