# Consumers Energy – Why Hometown Service Matters

We were pleased to welcome Roger Curtis, vice president of public affairs for Consumers Energy. (This RIM correspondent

must reveal he is recently retired from Consumers Energy and enjoyed working for and with this other Roger since he arrived in 2018!)

Curtis said he learned the importance of customer service when he ran Michigan International Speedway (MIS). One of the reasons he decided to join Consumers Energy was because of the company's focus on what it calls "Hometown Service."



Hometown Service

Leaning into being big to GO BIG

 Striving to be good and DO GOOD for customers and communities

Showing up and DOING

"So what is Hometown Service? It's a way of serving customers that meets them where they are," Curtis said. "Hometown Service done right, keeps customers coming back – even when times are toughest." Curtis admitted that people going to MIS had a choice to attend; for the most part, Consumers Energy's customers don't have that option. But he said Hometown Service matters even more.



"I can tell you with all honesty, at Consumers Energy, from our CEO Garrick Rochow on down, we believe that is an even greater reason to provide excellent service and deliver exceptional customer value," Curtis said.

Jackson-based Consumers Energy is one of Michigan's oldest and largest companies, with 8,000 employees and serving all 68 Lower Pensinsula counties. Curtis said the company uses that size and resources to focus on the customer. In fact, each of those employees (and this reporter can confirm this) carries customer service as an annual performance goal, or "metric."

"We don't always get it right, but as one of Michigan's biggest companies, it's our privilege...no, it's our responsibility, to strive to do more – and to be a force for good," Curtis said.



It's About HOW We Show Up. Hometown service is leaving it better than we found it.

He said many big companies will try and convince you that they're not big. But, at Consumers Energy "because we are a big company, we want to lean into being big so we can go big with Hometown Service in real, tangible ways." Many things Consumers has to do, fix lines, install meters, make various repairs, etc., disrupt people's lives, and they know that. "So it's important to leave our customers' homes, businesses and lives better than we found them down to the last detail," Curtis said. For example, Curtis recalled an outage in Northern Michigan's Fife Lake. When crews got done with their work, they took the time to pick up a number of flower pots knocked over during the severe storm.

"It's an incredibily small example, but it's emblematic of a larger commitment to hometown service that's embedded in our culture," Curtis said.

He said this Hometown Service focus translates to other company initiatives, including its response to the COVID 19 pandemic, its Our Town program and its Clean Energy Plan.



It's About Stemming COVID-19's Impacts. Hometown service in energy and beyond.

• When COVID crippled Michigan's businesses, Consumers Energy trained its Business Center represenatives to be well-versed in federal and state COVID relief programs, helping them stay open or get back on their feet. In 2020, the company, its employee and retiree volunteers and its Consumers Energy Foundation contributed over \$19 million to Michigan non-profits.

• The Our Town program provided 1:1 matches through local chamber of commerce's gift card programs. For the Muskegon Lakeshore Chamber, that meant 2,500 additional gift certificates that put money back in the community this past holiday season.



It's Making Lives and Livelihoods Easier. Because this is Our Town, too.

 As part of the company's Clean Energy Transformation, the company is using its successful community transition plan from the 2016 closure of the B.C. Cobb Plant here in Muskegon as a blueprint as it works to be coal-free by 2025 and have net zero emissions by 2040. This includes closing the J.H. Campbell Complex in nearby West Olive 15 years earlier than originally planned. As it did in the Cobb closure, Curtis said the company is committed to finding new roles for Consumers Energy employees who want to remain, helping local leaders pursue new economic futures and fulfilling the company's environmental responsibilities at each of the closed sites.
