This Week's Program: Muskegon Career Tech Center Update



Speakers: David Kirksey & Kyle Fiebig Introduced by: Lisa Tyler Reporter: Roger Morgenstern

As a board member of the Muskegon Area Intermediate School District (MAISD) **Lisa Tyler** got to introduce our program *and* understandably brag about the MAISD's Career Tech Center. "The

career tech programs in our county are phenomenal. They're not the classes we may remember from our youth."



Our speakers were Kyle Fiebig, director of Career and Tech Education and David Kirksey, principal of the Career Tech Center (CTC). David, a Muskegon native, came back to town after being a principal in Kalamazoo for 13 years. His enthusiasm for what the CTC does was very clear. His presentation focused on a 1910 quote from Mark



Twain and how it still rings true today: "Out of the public schools grows the greatness of a nation." Kirksey said while Twain made that remark when public education was defined by the one-room schoolhouse, there are three areas that still apply to today's school system: Providing an "Educational Center," civic engagement and economic improvement. "These three areas are still relevant today and I think the CTC still embodies each of these."

From auto collision to welding, the CTC offers 16 different programs to all Muskegon County students no matter where they go to school; public and private districts, charter schools and home school students can all participate. Currently 876 students are enrolled, and unlike other similar programs around Michigan, the CTC is growing, with waiting lists for some programs. Each of the programs has a Community Advisory Board to make sure the material remains current and relevant. The CTC also offers internships and various

leadership roles and opportunities to "teach the teacher" as most of their instructors come from industry, and not education.

David thanked Rotarians for their support of the CTC as community business leaders. "Our county has embraced the trades. If you all weren't our there working and creating jobs, these students would have no place to go." Thanks in part of an engaged business community and a successful tax millage, the CTC has the latest technology for students and the students are being taught by those who have worked in the various industries. "Most of our instructors are pulled out of industry" and didn't go to school to become teachers.

While Kirksey works within the CTC, Kyle Fiebig is out in the community to connect the CTC to career opportunities across the county. One



of his focuses is on talent development "to create a college and career-ready culture for all of Muskegon."

Fiebig referenced cards on each of the tables (see below) to help engage Rotarians in this effort to make connections across the community to help our youth plan their future after high school.



Using a GIS Map (Geographic Information System), we are locating & defining opportunities where K-12 students can find help as they PLAN their future life after high school.

Talent development is critical to a community's growth. Talent development is a shared responsibility between local schools, higher education, community organizations, government agencies and business connections.
