This week's program: Muskegon County Biking Coalition

Rob Taylor serves as chair of the Muskegon County Bicycle Coalition (or MCBC) and introduced two of the coalition



members for the program, one of them his wife of nearly 50 years, Priscilla Taylor and the other, Melanie McLeod. They provided an overview of the MCBC, formed in 2020 with a goal of making bicycling more accessible in the community.



Its mission statement says it all: "To create an inclusive, diverse, and accepting community where people of all ages and backgrounds bicycle for transportation, errands, and for

fun and health, and where bicycling brings people and neighborhoods together throughout Muskegon County."

The organization has continued to grow and in 2024 was named Club of the Year by the League of Michigan Bicyclists.



In 2024, the MCBC logged more than 2,000 volunteer hours, had 144 bikes donated and 158 bikes repaired. It also conducted several "bike rodeos," comprehensive safety and skills clinics where more than 400 young children learn to bicycle safely.

The MCBC may be best known for the weekly community rides they organize. On Mondays, it's the community "roll on" that begins at the Muskegon Farmer's Market, Tuesday evenings beginning and ending at Unruly brewery in downtown Muskegon and Thursdays in downtown Whitehall, beginning and ending at Fetch brewery. "Bikers like to end their rides with beer," McLeod joked.



The MCBC works with a variety of community partners to improve

access to bikes and bicycling across the county. For example, it works with the Muskegon Area District Library's Muskegon Heights branch on a "bike library" lending program. While the program is open to people of all ages, Taylor said many adults use it as "affordable transportation." Thanks to a grant last year from the Muskegon Rotary Foundation, the MCBC purchased 20 bikes that are easy to ride in various weather conditions. They will be added to the Bike Library in May.

Another program where MCBC is partnering with others involves the Muskegon EXIT Program. This mediation and restorative services program partners with the Muskegon County Sheriff's Department and the Muskegon County Jail. With the MCBC providing bikes, parts and training, the EXIT Program works with inmates soon to be released to learn skills to repair bikes. The bikes are then returned to the MCBC for use in the community. Some of those who have learned the repair skills have been able to receive bicycles either for themselves or a family member. In 2024, the EXIT program repaired 58 bikes.

Across the county, the MCBC has worked with local governments to enact ordinances requiring 5 feet of space between bicyclists and cars to improve safety. The MCBC has also been a catalyst behind a Greenway Plan now underway for Muskegon County and Northern Ottawa County. Thanks to grant

dollars, the West Michigan Shoreline Regional Development Commission (WMSRDC) has hired a consultant to complete the plan later this year.



During the presentation, we saw several videos from organizations benefitting from MCBC's efforts, including Muskegon Christian Schools. They worked with the coalition to use various spare parts to build "balance bikes" which help 4-6-year-olds learn to ride a bike without training wheels. The small cycles don't have pedals; kids use their feet to balance themselves on the bikes. As their confidence grows and balance improves, they can glide on the bikes and are then ready for bicycles with pedals but without training wheels. By working with the MCBC, the school saved \$10,000 in costs. McLeod said a grant has allowed MCBC to purchase new balance bikes to be used at bike rodeos and other community events.


