THIS WEEK'S **PROGRAM: Gambia Service** Project



Speaker: Bella Santiago Lindsay Introduced by: Mark Meyers Reporter: Roger Morgenstern

We were treated to an inspirational program about the African country of The Gambia and proof that Interact is creating the next generation of world leaders.

Bella Santiago Lindsay, currently a junior at the University of Pennsylvania studying economics and global health, is a proud North Muskegon alum and past president of the NM Interact Club. Many of us remember our summer college years...an hourly job somewhere, maybe an internship but plenty of time for sun and fun. Not Bella! She spent 3 months last summer in The Gambia, on the west coast of Africa, where saying living conditions are difficult would be an understatement. She worked alongside Power Up Gambia on a solar and water project to support maternal and children's health.

Bella was joined at Club by her sister (who like her is visiting El Salvador as a high school student), mother and grandmother. A proud family indeed. Remember this young woman: her future goals include possible masters' or PhDs in economics, public administration, international health and would be interested in careers with the

United Nations or the World Health Organization.

Lindsay was very appreciative of our Club's financial support as well as the Water & Environmental Humanitarian Outreach Projects (WEHOP) for the \$16,000+ raised for the trip. Funds Included \$1,000 each our Club's World Services Committee and WEHOP. Mark Meyers, who has gotten to know Bella through work with our World Services Committee, said she's being too modest. "Her original goal for this trip was to raise \$8,000 and she doubled that amount."

The Gambia

The Gambia, a former British colony, is the smallest inland country in Africa with a population of more than 2 million. The country stretches east from the Atlantic Ocean and is surrounded by Senegal. "I had no idea where I was going before I went there," Lindsay admitted. Her university has had a relationship with the country since 2006, started by a professor and other amazing students that preceded her, raising \$250,000 to create Power Up Gambia.

While there, Lindsay and two other Penn students were able to spend time with local residents and experience the country's rich history and traditions. She attended a 4-day wedding celebration, a 2-day national holiday and learned a lot about the country's layers of leadership in her rural village, home to 4,000 people.



The village is home to the Bwiam General Hospital, the country's largest Muskegon Rotary in Motion Newsletter - Page 2

rural hospital and one of seven hospitals in The Gambia. It was built in 2003 by the British and in 2006 Power Up Gambia helped bring reliable water and electricity to the area. The hospital serves 30,000 patients a year and has 120,000 residents in its general service territory.

This trip greatly improved conditions for maternity patients visiting the hospital's Community Health Post in several areas:

Solar: Installed solar panel units, powering lights, fans and charging medical and personal devices; Infrastructure: Established sound corrugated steel roofing, cardboard ceilings, and tiling;

Water: Established connection to a reliable water source and built washbasins and bathrooms; Furnishings: Provided sufficient labor beds, windows, doors, chairs, and paint.

The before and after photos Lindsay provided were amazing. Gone is the lack of patient privacy, moldy conditions, and other barriers to good maternal health. The long-term goal is to encourage expectant mothers to have their babies at the hospital, to help improve the country's very high infant mortality rate.

"While I'm not pre-med, I did help the patients," Bella said. "The residents said, 'you're from America, you have an education, so help us deliver babies!""



"This project allowed us to support 3 of the 7 Rotary International objectives: Fight Disease, Provide Clean Water, Sanitation, & Hygiene, and Support Mothers and Children," Lindsay said. While there are two active Rotary Clubs in The Gambia, they are not based near her village but she intends to continue to reach out to them to make that important RI connection. She said the hospital's administrator has connections with Rotary.

More help is needed, she said. She is working to secure \$2,000 from our club or our school-based Interact programs for repairs to the community's solar operated water pump.



Longer term, she and her fellow Penn students are working to raise \$57,000 to improve the maternity ward and create a Neonatal Intensive Care Unit (NICU) which would greatly improve the infant mortality rate, currently twice the national average. The group recently received a \$30,000 matching grant from Seeds of Change to help in this effort. That organization also supported last summer's work. It's clear Bella's group has a detailed plan that will greatly help them raise the needed money.



"Thank you so much for your support," she told our Club. "It's great to have support from my hometown even when I'm in The Gambia."

She also encouraged the continued work of our Interact Clubs across Muskegon County. "Rotary Interact was the reason I wanted to do something like this. The opportunities that Interact exposes you to help you want to do more and help more."
