## This week's program: History of the Recovery Center

Speakers: Dave Johnson Introduced by: Arn Boezaart Reporter: Sue Samaniego

Our guest speaker, David Johnson director from the Muskegon County Resource Recovery Center. Formerly known as the wastewater management system, Dave explained the how the innovative system works and several exciting new projects, including a 250-megawatt solar "farm" power generating facility being built by Consumers Energy and a plan to connect Coopersville's wastewater facility to Muskegon's operation, allowing for the expansion of five agricultural based businesses southeast of the Muskegon plant.

#### The Nation's First Large-Scale Land Treatment Water Resource Recovery Facility

The MCRRC celebrated its 50th anniversary last year, but what is the history behind it?

The biggest driving factor for starting this facility was the state of Muskegon Lake. The papermill was dumping 15 million gallons per day into it and it was an environmental disaster. At the time, North Muskegon, Muskegon and Muskegon Heights each had a wastewater treatment facility, but none was large enough to handle this much of an increase. The idea to build a county-wide system large enough to handle all of this was born.

Penn State had an experimental project called the "Living Filter" which used crops to filter and clean wastewater. Bauer Engineering was engaged to design a system modeled after this project in July 1970. The differences between the land used by Penn State and the land in Muskegon County as well as the size of the projects were significant. Major design changes were required. Bauer Engineering's bold plan moved forward.

In August of 1971, \$16 million in bonds were sold and the land was acquired. In May of 1971, construction bids were awarded. Flows started to come into the new plant in May 1973. That design has worked for 51 years now.

The system requires some upfront treatment. Mixing cells are used to eliminate carbon-based waste then the water moves into an aerated settling cell to allow the solids to settle out. The water then moves to the storage lagoon.

When the water arrives in the storage lagoon, bacteria, nitrogen and phosphates still need to be removed. The water is pumped to farm fields where corn, alfalfa and soybeans are grown. The plant roots take up nitrogen and phosphorus. The bacteria stays on top. The filtered water collects in drainpipes and is then sent to a ditch and eventually into the Muskegon River.

In September 2020, the name was changed from the Muskegon County Wastewater Management System to its current name. This was driven by a rebranding of the entire field of wastewater treatment.

Flow to the RRC, so they began looking for alternative uses for the land. One area had poorly draining, clay soil. For crop use, the soil needs to be sandy because there cannot be ponding of water. The area does not have municipal water, which made it less attractive to many businesses.

Two proposals were received for solar energy use. Tradewind Energy out of Kansas did the original development, then sold the lease to Consumers Energy in 2018. After jumping through a variety of loops, groundbreaking for the solar project occurred in July 2024.

In December of 2022 a \$60 million Michigan Strategic Fund Grant was received to build a pipeline to connect Coopersville to the MCRRC (Southeast Regional Force Main). Five companies drove the effort to increase the wastewater treatment capacity so they can expand: Fairlife, Continental Dairy, Applegate Dairy, DeVries, and Swanson Pickle.

Eight construction projects will complete this pipeline. The first five projects connecting Coopersville to the West Randall Pump Station will be completed by November 2025. The final three which will redirect Coopersville Main Pump Station and sewer flow and build emergency retention ponds in Coopersville will be completed by Sept. 2026.

This project will add 2 million gallons per day more to our plant by 2026. At that time, the five businesses will be able to begin their expansion efforts in full.
