



THIS WEEK'S PROGRAM: Rotary Peace Builders Committee

As part of the Diversity, Equity, and Inclusion (DEI) Committee, the Peace Builders Committee began in 2021 from being "deeply concerned about the local

community divisions on many issues here" according to **Cathy Brubaker-Clarke**. Cathy and **Kelly DeVos** are cochairs and current members include **Contessa Alexander**,



Andy Buelow, President Jane Clingman-Scott, Jim Fisher, Marcia Hovey-Wright, Annette Jack, Bob Lukens, Nancy MCCarthy, John Noling, and Doug Wood.



There are seven Rotary Centers of Peace around the world: Thailand (Bangkok), England (Bradford), Australia (Brisbane), Uganda (Kampala), North Carolina (Durham and Chapel Hill), and Japan (Tokyo). Designed to enhance the Rotary International (RI) mission of advancing world understanding, goodwill, and peace, our Peace Builders Committee



uses similar models of programs and projects that align with RI's six areas of focus. Our Peace Builders Club concentration is on peace, conflict prevention, and conflict resolution with three major responsibilities which are "raise the profile, educate and empower, and engage."

Their first activity was the International Peace Day 2022 Celebration at Rotary Park with the dedication of three peace poles (from artists Hallie LeBlanc, Bryce Thompson, & Brenda Rodriguez), a keynote address from Rotary International Peace Fellow, Gaia Pampu, Kylee Foster's spoken word poem "Peace", and Cruz Pena on the violin.



The committee also educated themselves through the Institute for Economics and Peace with a short course to introduce the transformational framework of Positive Peace where they learned Positive Peace "is not only the right way to live but also the best way to live economically." The course included five modules (overview, understanding peace, peace in the world today, peace as a solution, and Rotary and Positive Peace) which ties these elements back to our Rotary Club. Cathy encouraged all our members to visit the website at www.economicsandpeace.org and participate in the free course as well.



A highlight of the course that Cathy appreciated was that peace is not just the absence of war or physical combat, it includes so much more and is demonstrated through indicators such as healthy life expectancy, low levels of corruption, a sound business

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environment, well-functioning government, and good relations with neighbors. The Positive Peace Index (PPI) was developed to evaluate factors that lead to a peaceful society and there are 23 indicators grouped into three subdomains: societal safety and security, levels of domestic and international conflict, and percentage of Gross Domestic Product being spent on militarization. In 2022, Iceland was the most peaceful country and the U.S. ranked 129th out of 163 countries measured.



Doug Wood spoke about the eight Pillars of Peace:

-Well-functioning government
-Sound Business Environment
-Low Levels of Corruption
-High Levels of Human Capital
-Free Flow of Information
-Good Relations with Neighbors
-Equitable Distribution of Resources
-Acceptance of the Rights of Others



When examining the eight Pillars, he posed the questions of if our attitudes, institutions, and structures are ready and designed to tackle the idea of Positive Peace? Doug mentioned he is honored to be wearing the Rotary logo today

because with Rotary's diverse approach to peacebuilding and conflict prevention, the Positive Peace



framework is a natural fit for Rotary members. The framework helps communicate and contextualize Rotary's work in building peace locally and around the world. Doug proudly said, "If you're a Rotarian, you're part of a peacebuilding organization." We are practitioners, educators, mediators, and advocates.



Ways to become a larger part of the peace builder community are to join the Rotary Action Group, become a member of Muskegon's Peace Builder Committee, provide grants and financial support (humanitarian projects, scholarships, youth programs, vocational training programs), and share the role of Rotary in building peace. The committee recognized that our community is lacking data for the PPI and is looking into trying to get some of their questions onto the county health surveys. Another way to participate is attending the International Peace Day celebration on September 21st with a special guest speaker from Braver Angels.
