DEI Program at MCC

Speaker introduced by **Doug Wood** *RIM Reporter:* **Roger Morgenstern**

One of the many community hats Kathy Moore wears is as a Trustee for Muskegon Community College, so she had the honor of introducing our speaker, MCC's inaugural Chief Diversity Officer, Ken James. A native of San Diego, Ken is a familiar face to many, as the former Affirmative Action Director for the City of Muskegon and his community involvement during that time. His other work experience includes the Grand Rapids Chamber of Commerce, where he served as Director of Inclusion since 2018 before coming to MCC last September, as well as stints at Hackley Hospital and Grand Valley State University. Among his

professional achievements is his Executive Certification in Diversity Coaching from Howard University's School of Business.

"In all the roles I've had I've looked at things through the lens of diversity, equity and inclusion," James said.

Since joining MCC, James has been busy implementing a diversity, equity, and inclusion (DEI) strategy and serving as a catalyst to leverage best practices and resources across campus to promote a culture of inclusion. The goal is to ensure that individuals of all racial and ethnic identities, ages, nationalities, social and economic status, sexual orientation, gender identity/expression, religious, political and ideological perspectives, and physical and mental abilities are able to thrive and be engaged.



James said he has been very busy listening to members of the community as he creates MCC's strategy and hires staff members. While he may be the first Chief Diversity Officer, "MCC is ahead of the game" with DEI leadership from President (and Rotarian) Dale Nesbary, the Board of Trustees (which includes several Rotarians) a solid reputation and putting funding in place for the DEI program, with contributors including the Community Foundation for Muskegon County.

James said those three words that make up "DEI" "are all very important

and they're all very different....they're what make us all unique."

Take "Equity," for example, and how it is different from "Equal." He said if he was being "equal," he would give everyone in the room size 14 shoes, because that's what he wears. If he was showing "equity," he would provide each person the size and type of shoe to fit their individual needs.

James said one of his challenges is to put this DEI strategy in place but also "manage current circumstances" which can vary depending on the audience; one group may think changes are coming too slowly while others may believe the pace is too fast.

"I never discount a person's lived experience," James said, adding said he prefers "dialogue and discourse" to confrontation in addressing sensitive issues.

He said MCC's four pillars for DEI are: cultural awareness,

workforce/organization strategy, cultural competency and community outreach. To build on those pillars, James is establishing four stakeholder groups "with a DEI lens" in the following areas: students, faculty/staff, the community at large and the business community. He said looks forward to working with the community to move MCC's DEI efforts forward. "There are already things in place and MCC will pick up the baton and run with it."
