born in Muskegon, MI on July 19, 1931 to Thomas & Addie (Pattenger) Clock Sr. and proudly served his country as a pilot in the US Navy. He married the former Carolyn VanDyke on November 27, 1954 and she preceded him in death in 2013. Mr. Clock was the former owner of Clock Funeral Home

and had served on the board of National Selected Morticians. Wavne was a member of Samuel Lutheran Church where he served on the council and also sang in the choir. He was a past President of the Muskegon Public Schools Board of Education, had served on the board of Muskegon Federal Savings and Loan, the Muskegon Country Club and the Hume Home. ### Juneteenth National Independence Day

On January 1st, 1863, President Abraham Lincoln issued the **Emancipation Proclamation which** stated all enslaved people in the confederate territory in rebellion against the Union "shall be then, thenceforward, and forever free." At the time, many enslavers moved to Texas. They felt the state was a "safe haven" for slavery since there was not a large Union presence or large-scale fighting over the matter. When the war ended in June 1865, General Granger arrived in Galveston Texas with news of the Emancipation Proclamation. Slavery was officially abolished by December of that year and 2 years after it was written into law.

June 19, 1865, is considered by some to be America's 2nd Independence Day even though it took 155 years to become recognized as a Federal Holiday. It was federally recognized after one of the most intense years of social upheaval in modern American history that included the murders of George Floyd, Breonna Taylor, and Ahmaud Arbery.

### Juneteenth in Muskegon

### 2014 - 2020

• Paul Allen Billings, owner and operator of 103.7 The Beat, started hosting Juneteenth Celebrations in Muskegon from 2014 – 2016



• In the summer of 2020 during the height of Black Lives Matter protests there was a Juneteenth Protest and census push at Hackley Park

#### 2021

• After the turnout at the 2020 Hackley Park Protest, Jennifer Ross and others recognized a void in local celebrations of this historic event, especially in a county as diverse as Muskegon, and Juneteenth Muskegon Heights was born

• Muskegon Heights 2020 was mostly a grassroots crowdfunded event put together by local organizers and funded by small dollar donations from individuals and corporate sponsors



• Thousands attended the fireworks and some parked across Seaway Drive to watch the display

• This was an opportunity to show off the local gem that is Mona Lake Park. There was a diverse crowd and no incidents of note. It was an opportunity to celebrate diversity and showcase the City of Muskegon Heights

### 2022

• In 2021 Juneteenth Muskegon Heights proved to be a success. and word of mouth was so strong they raised the vast majority of this year's funds from corporate donors and nonprofit groups

• Expansion from 1 day to a 3-day event (June 17-19) partnering with Rotary Club of Muskegon which is hosting their annual Community Mixer on Friday June 17th, a networking mixer on Saturday June 18th, and June 19th is a full day of events including fireworks.

### **Paul Harris Fellow**

#### Bishop Nathaniel Wyoming Wells, Jr. (In Memory)

Bishop Nathaniel Wyoming Wells, Jr.-a stalwart leader in the community and the Church of God in Christ (COGIC)—completed his earthly service on March 24, 2020. Over the course of his 78 years, he created a tremendous legacy of devotion to the church, faithfulness to God, and fidelity to his family.

In his early years, Bishop Wells had two loves: music and basketball. He became a star forward on his high school basketball team, The Benton Harbor Tigers. Off the court he could often be found on stage demonstrating his vocal talents or showing off a little swagger on the saxophone as the front man for this band, The Decathlons. But as he grew toward manhood there would be only one great love of his life: Mary Ann (Houston) Wells. The two met in high school, married, and had five children. As a young husband and father, Bishop Wells became a stand-out insurance agent for Metropolitan Life, but even as he rose to the pinnacle of the industry, he knew he had a higher calling.

Working alongside his father, Bishop Wells heeded that call and entered the ministry. He became pastor of Muskegon's Holy Trinity Institutional Church of God in Christ in 1976, and upon the death of his father in 1983, assumed leadership at Community Church of God in Christ in Benton Harbor. With a strong work ethic that was exceeded only by his faith in God, Bishop Wells set about building a ministry that would transform hundreds of lives. His vision was to serve both the spiritual and temporal needs of his congregations, and from that vision, his Total Man Ministry was born.

"We have always spiritualized our people, but we have never done total man ministry," he told *The Muskegon Chronicle* in 2000. "We don't minister to the mind and body as well as the spirit."

He would go on to establish programs in education, housing, transportation, and childcare. In 1991, Bishop Wells founded the Trinity Nonprofit Housing Corporation, which built and operated affordable housing developments across the Midwest. In 1995, he founded the Tri-Valley Academy charter school. He also put in place a transportation system that ferried workers to and from jobs in nearby cities. The system contributed \$6 million to West Michigan cities annually.

Additionally, Bishop Wells served on the Board of Directors for TCT Television Network, where he broadcast his Total Man Ministry across the globe to 147 countries on a weekly basis.

He received several awards for his contributions to the betterment of the community. In 1975, he was named an NAACP Man of the Year. He was given the statewide Jeanne Peterson Award in Affordable Housing in 1999. A year later, he received the Muskegon County Economic Development Award and the Muskegon Bar Association's Liberty Bell Award. In 2003, he was named Most Influential Person of the Year in Muskegon.

Even as he focused on the needs of his flocks in Michigan, Bishop Wells became a leader in the national Church of God in Christ, the largest African-American Pentecostal denomination in the United States. In 1985, he was elevated to the position of Jurisdictional Bishop for Western Michigan and went on to serve two terms with the National Trustee Board and the National Judiciary Board. He was then elected to the General Board—the distinguished twelvemember governing body of the national church—and served until his passing. As he continued to grow in his faith, he remained both a student of theology—earning a doctoral degree in theology from Midwest Theological University in 2014—and a powerful teacher. He authored two books that drew upon his faith and family: Drawing from the Wells and Overcoming Satanic Devices.
