**Kris Collee** introduced Clarence Rudat of The FARM as part of the MSU Agriculture Department. Clarence grew up in Muskegon and graduated from Muskegon High School. He left West Michigan to attend college and has now returned home.

#### Michigan State University Product Center





The Michigan State University (MSU) Product Center and the West Michigan Food Processing Association announced a partnership on Monday, August 2, 2022 that brings the university's resources to the doorstep of west Michigan food companies and innovative entrepreneurs.

Clarence Rudat shared that The Michigan State University Product Center assists young entrepreneurs develop and refine their companies and skills. Clarence is the director for the MSU product center located in Muskegon. Clarence extended his thanks to numerous foundations and agencies that helped to fund The FARM and expanding food and agriculture industries in Muskegon. The West Michigan Food Processing Association, in partnership with the FARM, was proposed to Muskegon County and Muskegon Community College agreed to house the project here in Muskegon. Everyone in the community came together to make FARM happen.



The FARM was created by CANR, ABR, and MSUE (MSU Extension) in 2003 and began working with businesses in 2004 and expanded through MSU Extension in 2010. 2022 saw the FARM flourish in partnership with West Michigan Food Processing Center and MSU is in process of taking over the location here in Muskegon and Clarence will act as director. The FARM is the only service under the product center of MSU located outside of East Lansing. The FARM also offers innovation counseling is





available in 9 service locations, and they are located statewide. The FARM facilities are state of the art and USDA/FDA certified. There are a large network of individuals and businesses available within FARM. The FPIC Food Processing and the Innovation Center is Michigan's leading independent pilot food processing facility. They had 130 production days and developed 22 new appliances.



The FARM is managed by the MSU Product Center. The clients provide their own equipment and longerterm leases are available with co manufacturers to spur innovation. There is also a mobile food processing lab that showed up at the FARM yesterday. It is designed to be on the education side of MSU and can assist students with transporting equipment. It is a state of the art, \$1.5 million dollar truck.



Target audience for the FARM focuses on fruit and vegetables producers, entrepreneurs and startups and R and D for medium to large food manufacturers, workforce development and training and technology and equipment manufacturing. They are also looking to have an anchor at the FARM for the school programs via the MAISD for customized meals for students that are developed locally, and students may participate in meal development for their school district. In addition to STEM training and education focusing on food and agriculture; the FARM is promoting AG Day at the Muskegon Farmer's Marker on May 7 and Harvest Day at West Central Research Station in Hart this fall to bring people closer to agriculture.



Product Center Clients, Public Private Partnerships, Leveraging Capital Engage Producer and Processors, Engaging Students and Workforce Development and Cultivating Research and Innovation is the recipe for success per Clarence. We need safe and



healthy food coming to our tables. FARM wants to help grow West Michigan in the food and agriculture industries. The FARM will also assist with locating food processing and innovation centers. Muskegon has excess wastewater available and therefore has room to grow the agriculture infrastructure in Muskegon. Food processing plants are running 24 hours a day and are only fulfilling 75% of the demand and the FARM's goal is to reach out to these businesses to assist with them. There are hundreds of agricultures and food processing jobs available throughout the country. Students needs to be engaged and get hands on technology, and to see that these professions are growing and in demand.
