Past President Mark Meyers, on behalf of the World Community Service Committee, spoke about their meeting on March 17, 2022 where they approved a \$1500 donation from the committee's budget toward the Rotary International Ukraine Refugee Aid effort. The committee is challenging our Muskegon Rotary club to raise an additional \$1500. At the WEHOP board last Tuesday, they approved \$1500 donation from their fund after hearing our Muskegon Challenge and are now challenging the other local clubs to match the \$1500 mark. John Noling also informed us that three of our Interact Clubs have set that goal as well and are now challenging the other Interact Clubs as well.

8th Street Park Updates



Asaline Scott reported the Muskegon Heights Police Department (MHPD) and the G.U.N.S. (Gaining Unity through Nonviolent Solutions) Programs are working to upgrade the 8th Street Park, located between Hovey and Barney Avenues, in the city of Muskegon Heights. The plan is to upgrade the Basketball Courts, the Football Feld, Playground Equipment, add Picnic Tables, and a Concession Stand. The current playground equipment is outdated and deemed unsafe.

The effort to fund these improvements is well underway, and organizers have almost reached their goal. To date, over \$64,000 has been raised through a \$14,000 grant from the Community Foundation for Muskegon County, a \$6,000 Federal Community Policing grant and support has been leveraged through a matching \$20,000 grant challenge by a local philanthropist that has been matched by Muskegon Community College, DTE, Comerica Bank, Hackley Community Care, Tyler Sales, Trinity/Mercy Health, D & D Logistics, Mr. Max McKee, Webb Chemical, The Grand Rapids/West Michigan Urban League, Muskegon Heights Optimist, Muskegon County Lake Hawks and many other individual donors. In addition, the Muskegon Tech Center students will build a Concession Stand in the spring of 2022.

Dr. Pamela Smith is coordinating this project and is asking for Rotary's help with donations for the playground equipment and assistance with the community installation on April 22nd.

This Week's Spotlight: Mark Eisenbarth

Pours for Polio: Muskegon Rotary Club Fundraiser



Speakers: Emma Peterson and Josh Silvis RIM Reporter: Susan Holkeboer

Emma Peterson, a director of philanthropy at Mercy Health, and **Josh Silvis**, a partner at Shoreline Insurance Agency, were our presenters and are part of the Pours for Polio Committee. They shared with us the event, what it means, and how to participate.

POLIO is spread person to person, primarily through water. It attacks the nervous system and can lead to paralysis and primarily affects children under 5. There is no cure for polio, but there is a vaccine. It's one of the main

reasons for the Rotary International work.





ROTARY INTERNATIONAL (RI) HAS **BEEN WORKING TO ERADICATE** POLIO SINCE 1979. The Eradication Initiative was launched in 1988 with the World Health Organization. In 1988 there were 350,000 Polio cases in 125 countries. Since then, Polio has been reduced by 99%. Polio still exists (endemic) in two countries: Afghanistan and Pakistan. There was recently a case discovered in Malawi. It was discovered as an outbreak of wild polio last month. This is actually two years after that continent was declared free of polio. They traced the case back to Pakistan. In response, they're going to be doing an immunization drive targeting 23 million children under five. The four neighboring countries are included in the drive. Hopefully they can cut it off with this immunization drive. This brings home the point that every child is still at risk as long as polio exists somewhere in the world. That's the relevancy behind our event and why we're doing it.



Before Emma joined Rotary, Frankfort and Beulah Rotary Clubs had an event called Pints for Polio: End Polio Now. We shamelessly stole their idea. They received a check from the Storm Cloud Brewery up there.

Josh said Tim Arter borrowed this idea and brought it back to Muskegon. After a committee was fleshed out with a great group of Muskegon Rotarians, the Pours for Polio initiative came about. The event will run from April 18 - May 1. It's come together quickly because of some really enthusiastic support from our partners out in the community: Burl & Sprig Cocktail Bar, 18th Amendment Spirits Co., Pigeon Hill Brewing Company, Rake Beer Project, Salty Pecker Brewing Company, Unruly Brewing, and Wonderland Distilling Co.

HOW IT WORKS: Local breweries and distilleries will offer a specialty drink, April 18 - May 1, 2022. Each group is approaching this slightly differently. For the most part they will be offering it for the two weeks of the event. A portion of specialty drink sales will benefit Rotary International. There will be one Rotary happy hour at each location (5 - 7 p.m.). It's been a long time since we've been able to go out as a group. Being on the committee has reminded Josh how much fun it is to be with fellow rotarians. Hopefully you'll be able to come to several happy hours. 2 Rotary members will be needed to serve as hosts at each happy hour. Rotarians and guests will be welcome. It will be a good opportunity to introduce your spouses or significant other to the people you spend all this time with and talk about. If maybe we recruit a number or two out of there that would be great. The hope is for at least 15 to be in attendance at each happy hour and purchase drinks. We are actually going to send a SignUpGenius around. This won't be a commitment. It will help to gauge the appropriate amount of food needed at these places. As part of the happy hour, there will be some light appetizers available to help soak up those specialty beverages. The drinks will be available for purchase throughout the entire period of time so if you can't make it to a happy hour you can still go back and have an impact on the fundraiser. \$250 sponsors are being sought to help offset the cost of the appetizers.




