John Noling, with books in hand and a suitcase by his side, announced the Honduras Trip will happen next week. Our Muskegon Rotary



Precise Writings: What's New with Resumes & Cover Letters

Rotary Club this week was grateful to have DeOndra Pentecost as presenter this week. DeOndra was born and raised in Muskegon and is a graduate of Muskegon High School. She has an Associates Degree from MCC, and BA in Criminal Justice from Grand Valley State University.

For eight years she has been employed by Mercy Health Project as a certified community health worker. As a young professional, DeOndra saw the need to help other young professionals, and has dedicated her career to helping others strive in a professional setting.

In December of 2020 she launched Precise Writings. Precise Writings is her business to help job seekers write resumes and cover letters. The goal of her business is to lend a helping hand in communicating the strengths of candidates to prospective employers, and land an interview.

Her services are ideal for anyone

who is seeking a career change, but doesn't know where to begin. Whether it be someone jumping industries and trying to find a




way to explain their market advantage in new situations. Or someone who simply needs a coach to help them best communicate the daily actions, and careers goals they have already achieved to new employers.

More than just a career, this a passion for DeOndra. She spends her spare time teaching nontraditional students at Hackley Public Library basic computer skills.



DeOndra in her presentation gave us the most practical tips and updates on the standards for resumes and cover letters.



A resume ultimately is a selling piece for yourself in a competitive market. It is where one puts their numbers, metrics, accomplishments, and anything you have gained in your employment across multiple jobs.



Resume standards have changed over the years. Back in the day it was typical for someone to produce one resume and shoot it out to all potential employers. Nowadays, most are expecting a resume tailored specifically to job being applied for.

Furthermore, the modern resume should not have personal pronouns included, and rather than an objective are now expected to have a career summary, which is delves into specific skills, career focus, top achievements, and quantifiable changes and data. When possible use action verbs to show exactly what you've done. For example: "I advanced", "I boosted", "I Improved", etc. Other key areas to include are any education or certifications, key accomplishments professional, and areas of expertise.



Cover letters have evolved right alongside the resume. But do you actually need a cover letter? DeOndra says yes. If you want someone to get to know you beforehand, it is an opportunity to create that personal connection prior to ever interviewing, and is need if you want to land the job.

A cover letter "goes over information on your resume and expands this information to the reader, taking them on a guided journey of your greatest achievements." It should not be filled with redundancies from one's resume, but instead expand and provide curated narrative to the potential employer. Most importantly, the cover letter should end with a Call to Action, suggesting that you are excited and looking forward to talking with them.
