# Last Week's Program: R.B. Annis Water Resources Institute



Speaker: Prof. Mark Luttonton Introduced by: Arn Boezaart Reporter: Susan Besteman

Where is the next Covid outbreak going to be? Where can I go to find the big brown trout? Do the Great Lakes have fungi that may be a source of an anti-cancer drug? These are just three of the many questions Professor Mark Luttonton and the



research staff at the R.B. Annis Water Resources Institute can answer. Professor Mark Luttonton is a faculty member of

the Department of Biology at GVSU and is presently serving as the Interim Director at the R.B. Annis Water Resources Institute (AWRI) in Muskegon where their mission is, "Integrate research, education, and outreach to enhance and preserve freshwater resources." With over 30 years in operation, they have achieved this goal; however, they are continuing to achieve more every year with their staff in Administration (4), Vessel and Field Station Ops (11), Outreach and Education (12), Ecological Research staff (22), and Joint Appointments (2 - Grand Rapids & Allendale Campuses).



Mark went into more detail about the facilities including a renovation to their conference room to host zoom conferences and the fascinating field station with twelve 350-gallon tanks used for experiments in a controlled environment with Muskegon Lake water.



They also have two research vessels (65'W.G. Jackson & 45' D.J. Angus) and a few small vessels (pontoon, electroshocker, & john boats).



AWRI has reached students in undergraduate classes, two MS programs (Biology with emphasis in aquatic sciences & Water Resource Policy with a broad international interest), and even K-12 programing with their Landside and Boat programs. With approximately 190,000 passengers on the AWRI vessels since 1986, their program may have touched more students in hands-on science than any other university or institution (at least in Michigan at this point) according to Mark. AWRI has a summer intern program where they bring in a couple dozen undergraduates (including from MCC) and they get the full spectrum of what it means to be a scientist (hard work, but the payoff is spectacular when they see the results and the impact that they have).



The research they do is extensive and valuable. They have been able to track Covid 19 in wastewater since the disease emerged and they are now able to tell us where the next outbreak is going to be before it happens. The water chemistry has started to link to microbial chemistry linked to life billions of years ago. Over 60 fungi in the Great Lakes has been linked to exhibit anti-cancer properties. And of course, they can tell you where the big brown trout are.



"AWRI is recognized as a leader in collaborative research that produces real world solutions for real world problems, training the next generation of aquatic science professionals, and in connecting society to the water resources." Mark would like others to recognize how precious our water resources really are.

## **Great Michigan Read**





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## Robert Lorin "Buzz" Kersman



Robert Lorin (Buzz) Kersman passed away peacefully at his home on Monday, February 26th, 2024. He was a true family man and will be greatly missed by friends & family.

He was born in Detroit, MI on August 29, 1939, to L. Herb Kersman and Elizabeth Hall Kersman. The family moved to Muskegon when Buzz was three, and he attended North Muskegon Public School until graduating in 1957. He continued his education at the College of William and Mary in Williamsburg, VA, graduating in 1962. From there he served in the US Army as a lieutenant in the Armor division, joining "Operation Big Lift" in which the Army flew an entire armored division over to Europe.

In December 1963 Buzz married his longtime sweetheart, Wendy Morris, and they both returned to Ft. Riley, Kansas where they continued to live until his term of military service was over. Returning to Muskegon with his wife and infant son, Buzz bought Kersman Company from his father, rather than work for him at the then Coil Anodizers. Together he and his father formed a third company, Kersco. Shortly after selling Kersman Company, Buzz joined his father at the then renamed Lorin Industries, taking over the presidency in 1985. He loved his work and the people there and made many improvements including co-generation, a specialized slitter and acid reclamation.
