THIS WEEK'S PROGRAM: Across the Bridge

The "Across the Bridge" initiative is a newly created cultural immersion collaboration that includes thought leaders from the Grand Haven and Muskegon area communities. It was inspired by Barbara Lee VanHorssen, founder of the Momentum Center for Social Engagement, a nonprofit organization encouraging people to extend more grace to one another; and synergizing partnerships to create a healthier, more inclusive community for all.

The program began with the introduction of speakers.

Barbara Lee VanHorssen – Director of the Momentum Center in Grand Haven, ordained minister, former Muskegon Rotary Club member, and current member of Spring Lake Rotary Club. Ken James – Chief Diversity Officer at Muskegon Community College and codeveloper of the Across the Bridge program. Contessa Hood-Alexander – Development Analyst at the City of Muskegon and co-chair of Muskegon Rotary's Diversity, Equity, and Inclusion committee. Gordon Gallagher – Spring Lake Township Manager and visiting Rotarian from the Spring Lake Rotary Club.



Ken James kicked off the presentation by explaining why he feels this initiative is important to the Muskegon community..."it helps to tear down perceived stereotypes and minimize the fallacy of separation through discourse dialogue and dissemination of information". Then Barbara Lee VanHorssen shared her passion and motivation behind her creation. She stated that "immersion is the fastest way to help people see the lens in which they see the world". Based on her experiences growing up in the Muskegon area, then later moving to Grand Haven – Barbara was alarmed on many occasions by the number of voices (on both sides) who would say things like "they are afraid to cross the bridge" - referring to the drawbridge between Muskegon and Grand Haven. She believes that people really need to spend time with other people whose life experiences are different than theirs.

Barbara also thanked the Muskegon Rotary Club for seeding the first \$500 grant that was leveraged with matches from both the Grand Haven and Spring Lake Rotary clubs to raise a total of \$1,500 to launch Across the Bridge in partnership with Muskegon Community College.

Eight thought leaders from both the Muskegon/Muskegon Heights area and the tri-cities Grand Haven/Spring Lake/Ferrysburg area were recruited to learn, experience, and explore unique qualities, as well as cultural and racial challenges in each community. The participants committed to spending three days and two nights (Friday morning through Sunday afternoon) immersed in each other's community, sharing the experiences, and discussing truths, while dispelling misconceptions. Contessa Hood-Alexander shared her experience as a resident of Grand Haven who really didn't engage or interact much in the area. Her opinion of



the tri-cities had been influenced by comments and criticisms she heard from co-workers and other associates - most of whom were white. She described the collaborative immersion weekend as an "impactful experience" that allowed her to explore more of Grand Haven and to talk about diversity and inclusion (one of her many passions). Contessa highlighted that she learned the "power of discernment" in her interactions and beliefs as it relates to interpreting and understanding various encounters, especially in unfamiliar territory. She stated that she was grateful for the opportunity to participate.



Gordon Gallagher advised the audience to positively respond to Ken or Barbara if either of them request participants for

this endeavor. He informed us that "this was a remarkable experience" for him. Gordan also shared that he intentionally wore "red" in an effort to fit in when the group attended a Muskegon Big Reds football game; but due to the cold weather, he had to put on his jacket which, unfortunately, was the opposing team's school colors. Fortunately, his feelings of awkwardness were comforted by his cohort members and he still felt welcomed. (Probably helped that Muskegon won the game.) Gordon stated that the reflection time that the group held each evening was really special to him. In conclusion, Gordon said that through this experience, he "built relationships that he hoped will stay with him for the rest of his life". Ken James concluded the program by informing us that they would like to do a second reiteration of the program this fall. Stay tuned for more information.
