WEEKLY COVID REPORT

Kathy Moore reported a downward trend. We were impacted with the large backlog. 12.8% positivity rate as of 5/16/2021. Cases are decreasing with 52 avg/day and we are opening up places to a 50% capacity with physical distancing still on June 1st. A total of 14 deaths in the month of May (these follow a similar pattern with co-morbidities and age).

Christine Robere reported things are getting a little bit better. There were no further new hotel check-ins this week. There was a food truck at the hotel Thursday afternoon. The number one need still is housing. The food pantries do need help with summer stock up and Kellogg reached out and WZZM is helping to promote these pantries.

Marty Gerencer—FARM



Marty is the Executive Director for the West Michigan Food Processing Association. This association is part of Greater Muskegon Economic Development (formerly Muskegon Area First) and the vision began in 2015 in partnership with Consumers Energy Foundation, Muskegon County Community Foundation, and 30 other collaborators that culminated into this association today.

"Our wastewater capacity, freshwater, land, logistics, interchange of US-31 and US-96 to Chicago and Detroit, and our deep-water port surrounded by 6,000 farms and over 200 food processors make this area very attractive to food companies."

Through this collective effort, they showcase Muskegon County and West Michigan assets to food companies throughout the world. Our wastewater capacity, freshwater, land, logistics, interchange of US-31 and US-96 to Chicago and Detroit, and our deepwater port surrounded by 6,000 farms and over 200 food processors make this area very attractive to food companies.

Since the association began in 2017, we've attracted dozens of food companies around the world leading to pending discussions with Greater Muskegon Economic Development, Muskegon County Chamber, and other community leaders.



Holistic • Supportive • Catalyst for Growth

Their annual conference will be focused on healthy food and more sustainable food practices and will be held on September 24th, 2021. This will be at Muskegon Community College followed by the ribbon cutting ceremony of the FARM (Food, Agriculture, Research, Manufacturing Center) accelerator facility. This facility has a vision to accelerate industry 4.0, food companies, pilots, and new technologies that will all lend forward more sustainable practices and introduce STEM training to high school and college students feeding our workforce future for the food industry and beyond.

Built in 2020, in spite of the pandemic, they were able to finish in the first quarter of 2021. Lively Up Kombucha is their first tenant and they are in discussions to onboard their second tenant. Some of the many partners to thank include Community Foundation from Muskegon County, Greater Muskegon Economic Development, Muskegon Community College, the Chamber, John Grace Construction, Progressive AE, Michigan Economic Development Corporation, Michigan and US Department of Agriculture and Rural Development, as well as many more. Michael Ramsey— Community EnCompass



Michael is on loan from Mercy Health Muskegon to Community EnCompass until March 2022 to facilitate and lead the Eviction Prevention Program for Community EnCompass' Homeless Services Division to the tune of \$2.5 Million pumped into our community over the last six months. A total of \$13 Million will be added as well for rental arrearages and utility assistance for Michael to oversee until next March. Michael is excited to help streamline services for those who need help to gain services easily, quickly, and efficiently, as well as allowing our community engagement for sustainability in the future.

Michael has been able to hire 15 more people to oversee these funds and activities in the Community Rental Assistance Program and Emergency Solutions Grant (homeless or at risk of being homeless funds). With increasing capacity across the board, a new phone system was purchased as well in order for easier accessibility to staff. Michael shared he is excited with the opportunities laid before us and partnerships because of the extra financial assistance. Some partners

include Mission for Area People, Muskegon/Oceana Community Action Partnership, and Mid-Michigan Community Action Partnership. Michael is grateful for these dollars our community has been given and they are looking to be the best stewards possible with this gift. In the beginning, our community was given \$100,000 but was awarded extra money after showing the great use of funds.

Dakota Crow—Boys & Girls Club



Dakota, Chief Professional Officer, thanked everyone who came out last Saturday to the Great FuTours Event!

Boys and Girls Club got started in Muskegon in 2015. The first one ever was back in 1867 in Hartford, CT. After looking for a home base for six years, they finally found it and worked out a contract that was signed last week with Muskegon Community College. This building was previously the MCC Lakeshore Fitness Center and YMCA before that. Dakota is looking forward to continuing the use of the building as another great community asset. Thank you to Tom Devoursney, Chris McGuigan, Bob Scolnik, Don Kalisz, D.J. Hilson, and the many others involved.

All of the other sites will continue to stay open with the exception of the Nelson Elementary site. They were seeing approximately 100 per day during school and approximately 200 per day during the summer months from the Nelson site so those kids and some more will now be at the new location. This new location will allow them to double their capacity for youth served for about the same amount of money with greater efficiencies.

Dakota shared some extra excitement with the extra opportunities coming including food service and outdoor activities for our community's youth. They will be able to provide transportation and there will be three phases for renovations beginning January 2022 for approximately 10 months.


