We are here today to honor a Rotarian who lives the Four Way Test in all that he does in his job and his community. This individual's foray into local government began many years ago when he was appointed Dalton Township Supervisor. While his elected "career" was short-lived, his commitment to public and community service is long. Roger first got to know this guy when he worked for Muskegon Area First and I was the Lakeshore community affairs manager at Consumers Energy. While he also worked with him in Kent County when he was the deputy administrator for the city of Kentwood, Roger knew he needed to get "home" to Muskegon County. Back in 2015, he encouraged him to apply for the vacant Consumers Energy Community Affairs Manager position. It had previously been held by three other Rotarians: Bill Johanson, Roger and Laurie Larsen, so it only made sense that he would get the job...and join Muskegon Rotary!

This week's program: Solar Power Project Muskegon County – Wastewater Mgmt.

Speakers: Rich Houtteman, Ryan Carrigan, and Shaun Casey Introduced by: **Rich Houtteman** Reporter: **Meredith Smillie**



Rich Houtteman provides some Consumers Energy history and introduces two colleagues to talk about the new solar energy facility at the Muskegon County Resource Recovery Center in Moorland Township.

Rich Houtteman (Community Affairs), Ryan Carrigan (Community Affairs) and Shaun Casey (Enterprise Project Mgt) were our featured presenters today. Consumers Energy shared with us an update on the solar farm located in Moorland Township. Consumers Energy is one of the state's largest landholders and taxpayer in Muskegon County. Rich noted that the past four years have been the windiest on record and shared with us the roadmap journey to limit the number of consumers that are without energy after any given storm. There are over 85,000 employees throughout the state. Rich emphasized the three awards that Consumers Energy has provided to invigorate the economy and shared a lot about the Foundation work that Consumers Energy is invested in, especially around diversity, equity, and inclusion. They partner with United Way and the Muskegon **Community Foundation to support** DEI work in Muskegon County.

Ryan is the stakeholder engagement officer for Consumers Energy for the solar project at Moorland.



Consumers Energy noted that this program is not just about being climate friendly, but it is also financial. Converting to solar is saving the state of Michigan consumers nearly \$6million. A single acre of solar can power 80 homes and the decreasing costs of solar has fallen 80% in the last decade. Solar performs well during peak energy use times. Ryan noted that the vast majority of solar panels are made up of glass, and small amount of aluminum. They are not toxic and environmentally friendly. They have a life span of 30 years and are highly efficient. Recycling of old panels has quickly ramped up and they are recycling. Utility scale solar can

generate at least 100 megawatts of power. Solar makes a good neighbor for those that travel or live near solar farms. They are fairly quiet and do not need much upkeep or maintenance. They are monitored remotely and are quickly detectable for repair or replacement. Consumers Energy staff are only onsite 2-3 times per year.



Ryan further noted additional community benefits. Rural preservation/farm protection, ongoing income for Muskegon County via long term lease agreements, increased tax revenue for schools, county services and townships, as well as construction and operations jobs creation. Solar in Muskegon County has high proximity to transmission lines, flat open land with limited development opportunities and the county's leadership desire to expand sustainability and renewable opportunities. Ryan noted that the Moorland wastewater facility was just a great location for this project.




Shaun Casey concluded our presentation and spoke about the footprint about the array itself. Over 555,000 solar modules, 110,000 pilings over 1,000 acres (approximately 3 square miles) and will include 2 substations.



The substations will convert from DC to AC and connect to the lines located across the street and be delivered to consumers. There will be over 1,500 miles of wire utilized. Ryan and Shaun noted that this is a smart system and that the panels will operate like batteries and can go into stow mode. Ryan and Shaun also noted that the panels do work at night, during the winter and when rain, hail or snow are present. Consumers Energy noted that all the permits needed are in place and they are already building. It is difficult to see the farm from Apple Avenue, as there are some natural areas that protect the project from view along M-46. The project will be fully functional in 2026.
